inform you that I have lost a
Cow by Pleuro-pneumonia, on the night
of the 18th of February last.

The Cow had been ailing for some
days previous, on the 14th of February
I called in Mr Malcome V.S. your
now Inspector, to visit her, under
whose treatment she remained until
the night of the 18th instant when she

he pronounced the Cow to be
labouring under "Pneumonia -
or lung disease," and directed me
to have her killed if she would not
be better before next day.
I accordingly on same evening
about 8 1/2 O'clock went for Mr
Matthew Courtney of Slaney Street
Ennisworthy to value the Cow,
there being no valuator at the time
appointed by your board, who
valued her, and I had the Cow
destroyed before morning. The reason
I took those precipitate steps were
for the protection of the remainder
of my Cow stock 12 in number,
in the same premises, and that
of my neighbours, their being a number

of Cow owners adjoining
on every side, and I suppose
having her conveyed from my premises
at an hour when their Cows were
in their houses and free from
coming into contact with the
diseased animal, as I had
done all things to the best of my
ability to stamp out the disease
in destroying the animal and
disinfecting my premises, I trust
your Honorable Board will give me
that Compensation which the law
allows, as I feel it would be a great
hardship on me, as a rate payer, to
be deprived of the benefit of the

Medical Officers Salaries.

PROCEEDINGS UNDER THE MEDICAL CHARITIES ACT, 14 & 15 Vic., cap. 68.

An Estimate of Medicines, &c., required by the Medical Officer of the
Dispensary District, approved by the Committee of Management, was laid before the Board, with a Requisition from
the Committee for the supply of the same, and directions were given thereon, as follows:—

to increase the Salaries of the Doctors
to £100 per annum - from 25th March
was withdrawn - Mr. A. stating
that several members of the Board
had stated to him that it was
better to leave the new Board -
(shortly to be elected) to deal
with the matter -

THE DOCTORS SALARIES.
Mr. Haughton on being called on to proceed with his notice of
motion in this matter, rose and said—On looking into the subject
of salaries, I find that the average salaries in Ireland of the Dispen-
sary Doctors is £110 a year, and the average salaries in the pro-
vince of Leinster is £120, so that the increase would still leave the
salaries of the Medical Officers of this Union less than the average
of all Ireland, and I consider our Doctors as second to none in their
care of the sick poor, and skill in the treatment of disease. With
regard to the increase of taxation that would result from the ad-
ditional £10 a year as proposed, it would be very small indeed.—
The total would be only £70, of which the government would pay
one-half, that would reduce it to £35, and of this small sum the
landlord would pay one-half, so that only £17 10s per annum would
come off the occupiers. Now one farthing in the £ on the valua-
tion of the Union would produce £150, so that I leave it to you to
judge that the increase of taxation would be very, very small.—
Notwithstanding the above reasons, I understand that some parties
are of opinion that this is a matter for the consideration of a new
Board, and I therefore, with the permission of this Board, with-
draw my resolution.

Ferns Waterworks.—A special meeting of the Ferns dispensary committee was called by the hon. secretary by order of the Board of Guardians to consider a report, and also a letter from the Local Government Board on the subject of the Ferns waterworks. There were present—Messrs Jonathan Haughton (in the chair); Joseph Haughton, Patrick Sinnott, William Rudd, L. Dundas, and R. Dockrill.

On consideration of the report and letter above referred to, the committee report as follows:—

"We find as regards the available supply that it has never been known to fail. Our hon. secretary has made due inquiries into the matter from the only possible available means of arriving at a satisfactory conclusion—that is, from information derived from the respectable rate-payers in the immediate neighbourhood, and he has been informed that this source has never been known to fail, or get much less. There was a test in the month of last September when springs are known to nearly altogether fail. He could at least say the source can be depended upon as to supplying the quantity. A sample of the water has been taken by our hon. secretary and by the Board of Guardians forwarded to Dr Cameron for analysis. As soon as the analysis shall be obtained it shall be laid before the Local Government Board. If Dr Cameron recommends filter beds they can be added to the plans and specifications. There appears to be considerable difference between Mr Barry's conclusion and Mr Sharp's as to quantity of water the reservoir will contain as laid before the committee. To take a report of the whole matter we beg to refer to it as showing the reservoir will contain five days supply. On reference to the minutes of the dispensary committee we find that in reply to queries contained in a circular of 26th of October, 1874, it was stated that the reservoir was nearly ten feet higher than the highest part of the town. But the mistake between ten and two may have arisen from the fact that in copying out replies for transmission to the Board of Guardians our hon. secretary may not have written the word ten as legibly as might have been necessary, hence the mistake. Mr Barry

appears to be under the impression that there was a paper headed section No 2, Kilbard, laid before him. But the committee having now had this paper before them beg to draw the attention of the Local Government Board to the fact that there is no such name as Kilbard" on the paper referred to; the name being legibly Kieboro, that is the townland in which the proposed reservoir will be situated. We forward the probable estimate of the net cost of the proposed works for materials in the work, but this makes no allowance for the profit a contractor may levy or for the outlay of his capital, and any risks incidental to the execution of the works. As to the difference in the tenders the Committee think that as precisely the same drawings and specifications were given to each party from whom tenders were received—and precisely the same information given to each; the difference in the tenders cannot arise from insufficiency of the drawings or specifications, but from this, that some of the tenders were from parties residing at very considerable distance from the works to be executed whilst others either resided or have their workshops close to or within easy reach of Ferns varying from the workshops into the town of Ferns to a distance of 70 miles; and also the different profits calculated by the different contractors. The tender for £640 was withdrawn.

Mr Sharp's report also accompanied the foregoing, both of which were ordered to be sent to the Local Government Board.

It is at least a month since I made a report affecting the school children who are learning a trade (see Report)

They get no outdoor exercise from morning till night & I find this state of things still continues, - the Shelter a Co. was appointed to consider the matter. As the case is a pressing one I would feel obliged if the Board would remedy it.

They also call attention to the overcrowding of the male infirm wards & also to the very defective means of ventilating them. In an ward 48 feet by 16 1/2 feet containing 19 patients, there are but 2 windows, a small portion only of which it is possible to open. The ward is a day room as well as a sleeping apartment. In such a ward the English Board requires 700 cubic feet of space to patient, these have little over 400. The case is worse in the Mens dormitory. There are 2 excellent rooms adjoining with sufficient space & ventilation which can be easily utilized &

Sir,—The Local Government Board for Ireland have had before them minutes of the Board of Guardians of Eniscorthy Union of the 14th Instant, in reference to reports received from Messrs. Murphy and O'Brien, Relieving Officers, respecting the condition of the graveyards in their respective districts, and respecting the area of charge of the cost of repairs at the Clons Grave Yard; and I am to suggest that the Guardians should take into consideration whether it would not be desirable to include within the scope of their operations all the old Burial Grounds standing in need of repair of fencing with the Union, and coming within the terms of the 1st Section of the 23rd and 24th Vic., not being attached to, or contiguous to any church, chapel, or place of worship, nor situate in a private demesne.

The whole Union is an area of charge distinctly recognized by the 32nd Section of the 19th and 20th Vic., cap. 98, and in the case of repairs of Old Burial Grounds, Union Rating would appear to be more applicable than Electoral Division rating, inasmuch as families who have changed their residences in time past, often bring their deceased friends to old Burial Grounds from a distance.
