FERNS WATER SUPPLY.
Local Government Board, Dublin, 4th May, 1878.
Sir, - With reference to a minute of the Board of Guardians of
Feniscorthy Union of the 28th Feb. last, relating to the proposed
supply of water for the village of Ferns, I am directed by the
Local Government Board for Ireland to enclose for the information
and consideration of the Board of Guardians a copy of obser-
vations made by Mr. Barney of this department on the subject. -
The estimates and specifications, &c., are returned herewith for
amendment. - By order of the Board,

Copy of Mr. Barney's observations, dated 16th April, 1878.
With reference to these proposed works, I beg to observe that I
do not deem the plans and specifications sufficiently complete
with the Engineer's observations.

The springs, it is stated, are too numerous to be shown on plan.
It will be better, and in fact it is necessary that such of them as it
is intended should supply the reservoir should be shown on the
plan, and the manner of collecting the water and leading it into
the reservoir, should be shown both on plan and in the section,
and also the overflow or water-weir from the reservoir to the
stream.

The difference in level between reservoir and town is stated to
be 9.27 feet, and not 2 feet only, as stated in the replies to queries in
circular of the 26th October, 1877.

It appears there is no other section of the proposed works - this
is with reference to my observation that there might be another,
the one sent being section No. 2.

Slope of Embankments. - It is not absolutely necessary this
should be altered, but at the same time it would be safer to have
made less steep, at least on the inside or water side, where they
would be liable to slip.

An iron grating only is scarcely sufficient to keep out extraneous
matter from the outlet pipe of the reservoir.

I still do not think the proposed fence round the reservoir suffi-
cient; it should be a close defence of some description; some ar-
rangement should also be made to cover or secure in some way the
spring that will supply the water.

A wash out valve will, I have no doubt, be found necessary on
the extremity of the main - any supply pipe that may be near it,
notwithstanding. The one at "Megue's Well" would also be ne-
cessary.

It will be better to put air valves where they are likely to be ne-
cessary.

The plans and specifications are not at present sufficient, and
should be made more complete. The estimates given neither
quantities or prices, it should be given more in detail.
