within 7 days, either to construct

piped so as to abate the nuisance &

his premises"

8 Votes to 9

Sir, - I am directed by the Local Government Board for Ireland to inform the Board of Guardians of Ennisecorby Union, that they have received Mr. O'Brien's half-yearly report relating to the Union, in which he states, as regards the financial condition of the Union, that at the present time there are about sufficient funds available to meet the liabilities of the Union to the 30th instant, but not more, and the Guardians will have nothing but the outstanding arrears of £413, and the proportion of the Parliamentary Grant, to provide for the expenditure of the concluding quarter of the current year, which will probably close with a deficit of about £1,200 or more, owing, Mr. O'Brien observes, to the large reduction made last year in the Clerk's estimate; and I am to request the attention of the Guardians to the matter.

Mr. O'Brien further states that on the occasion of his recent visit to the Workhouse he found the several departments in fair general order as regards cleanliness, &c., but the classification, as provided for by Articles 10 and 11 of the General Regulations, had been recently departed from in a very serious manner, by temporarily placing in one of the ground floor wards of the main building in the men's yard, a number of young women with children lately recovered from measles. It appears that these inmates

were originally placed in the fever hospital, but that on the admission there, some two weeks since, of two cases of small pox, it was deemed advisable to remove them from that, and in order to avoid mixing them with the healthy children in the nursery ward, the highly objectionable arrangement above referred to was resorted to; and I am to point out that under any circumstances the inmates of different sexes should not be placed, even temporarily, in the same department of the workhouse, and I am to request that this arrangement may be, if not already, discontinued, as it is obvious that the most serious abuses might result from it.

The sanitary condition of the workhouse is reported to be favourable, the three fever hospitals being entirely untenanted. - The children in both schools presented a clean and satisfactory appearance on the occasion of Mr. O'Brien's visit, and looked upon the whole very well, notwithstanding the epidemic of measles through which they have recently passed.

The Workhouse Buildings are, it appears, in a fair general state of repair, but the house is stated to require painting both inside and outside, and I am to enclose a specification for the performance of the work upon which a contract can be made by the Guardians.



In reference to the cases of small-pox reported by me to your Board at last meeting, I have to state that from enquiries I have made I have ascertained that the disease was imported from Dublin; that it is not yet epidemic in the locality, but is confined to the house in which the cases referred to occurred, and which being owned by a shoemaker is much frequented. Under these circumstances it is my duty to suggest to the Board the following

means of stamping out the disease. Those means are. (1) That all the effects in the house, including wearing apparel and also all the appliances of the owner's trade should be burned. (2) That the house should be thoroughly cleaned and lime washed.

Of course the questions of previous valuation and compensation, which should be liberally dealt with, are entirely matters for your Board.
