In compliance with the enclosed letter
I visited the village of Camin, and have to
report as follows: —

The site selected seems to be in my humble
opinion, central and in good position where water
will be found; the rock which appears to be is a
crystalline rock, of the Schistose stratum, and I
would recommend the well to be four feet
diameter in the clear and I would say, an
abundant supply would be had from 35 to
40 feet sinking, and a "Standard Rotary Lift
Pump" with fly wheel and handle, brass
casing bored and fitted with improved brass
valves, wrought iron rod complete. Size of
rod 3½ inches.

The probable expense for sinking,
steering about 5 ft from surface, stage and pump
above described would amount to about
£70.


