The milk for some time past has been so good in Hospital (sometimes containing from 15 to 30 per cent of cream) that it rather excited my suspicion. I therefore several times compared the milk in the dairy with that set at same time in the Hospital; the result being that the supply sent up to come under my notice in Hospital contained over 20 per cent while that in the dairy contained under five in no less than three different specimens - this is a very serious matter to the body of the house.

There is a boy in hospital named Murphy who has been a long time under my care for his eyes - as he is not any better I would recommend the Board to send him to the Ophthalmic Hospital.

The first step taken towards obtaining a water supply for Caim School was, I believe, the official statement of the Sanitary Officer, the Doctor of Killanne Dispensary District, that such a supply was necessary. A committee was then appointed by the Guardians to consider the subject and to take such steps as they should consider desirable, and to recommend an area on which to place the cost of any work undertaken. The committee met. The water supply has been obtained, and the committee believe that the cost will be much lighter than any similar supply of water has been obtained at before, especially considering the great depth (over 70 feet) to which the boring, part of which was through rock, had to be carried.

The Committee recommended that the area of taxation should be spread over the Divisions of Killoughrim, Castleboro and Killan, as from these divisions came the children attending the school. The numbers coming from each division will of course continually fluctuate, but the condition of the school indicates that, if well conducted, it will always be attended by children from these divisions. Unless on the principle of levying the rate off districts from which the children come, how can Castleboro division be taxed? It is not in the Dispensary District in which the school is, and consequently it has nothing to do with the Sanitary Authority at whose instance the water was obtained—Caim school and pump being in the division of Killoughram and Dispensary District of Killann. The fact is, the pump is put up for the school, the pupils of which come from the three divisions, but it will also be a great benefit to all parties residing between Blackstairs mountain and Kiltrea watering place. There is no proper watering place for cattle between Killan village and Kiltrea, a distance of about five miles. Now Caim is about half way between these two, and a trough for cattle to drink out of, will be placed there. The advantage of this will be felt more perhaps by the people from Killann than by those of any other district, and their cattle, &c, going to and from the fairs and markets of Enniscorthy, will reap great benefit.

I think I have shown that Mr. Whelan's statement that Killann should be exempted from contributing because it obtains no benefit cannot be supported. It benefits directly, because children from it attend the school, and also by having a drinking place on the main road from Killann to Enniscorthy.

Now for the Local Government Board. It thinks the area of proposed taxation is too large. The committee think, considering all the circumstances in their knowledge bearing on the matter, they could not make a fair adjustment than that they recommended. They object to the area named by the Local Government Board as being too small, and they consider the hardships of a small area of taxation as pressing more injuriously and severely than an error, in the other direction. They are confidently of opinion that Killann district will reap considerable benefit from the work done, and should pay some share of the cost.

I trust that, if the Guardians consider that their committee has acted with judgement and discretion, they will support their recommendations, more especially as it is evident that in this matter the local knowledge of the committee is much greater than that of the Local Government Board.

P.S.—There are no fewer than 12 children from Killann attending Caim school. This is a large proportion of the whole school.

Messrs.—I see by a report of the Enniscorthy Guardians at which a letter was read from the Local Government Board saying "they could not sanction the area of taxation for the erection of a pump at Caim," and that "they could not see no connection with that pump and the electoral division of Killann." Let me inform them, that many children come to the school from the division of Killann, namely from Greenane, and Glenglass—that the Sanitary Officer recommended the procuring of water for that school—that nearly all the people, if not all, when going to, or returning from Enniscorthy, their market town, must necessarily pass that road—that there is no convenient place for a man or beast to slake their thirst for a long distance—for the man there is the public house, but for the beast none.

Such being the case, I think the Local Government Board might,—if they are not blind,—see the connection with Killanne—absolutely the men, women, and children, cattle of all descriptions, will receive more benefit from the water at Caim pump than the people of the division of Killoughrim in which it is situate. The pump is now in full working order, giving a large supply of beautiful water, and there is a trough raised for cattle, and a ladle for the accommodation of the people. The Board of Guardians took up the matter, appointed a sub-committee to carry out the details—some of them landed proprietors—all tax-payers. Now when the work is all but completed the Local Government Board throws the bone of contention between the different divisions—excites animosity—rending parties where harmony flourished before. But such is their usual mode of acting, no matter in what way or how the thing was done, that Board should find fault in order perhaps, to show cause why they should draw a large stipend for doing nothing but mischief, carrying out their old motto—sic, &c.

CAIM WATER SUPPLY.

The following communications in reference to this subject were read:—

To the Chairman, Board of Guardians, Enniscorthy Union. Ballyhyland, 9th September, 1878.

SIR,—I perceive that Mr. Whelan, Guardian of Killan, has given notice of his intention to move a resolution, on the 19th instant, that the cost of sinking the pump at Caim National School, be levied off the divisions of Killoughram and Castleboro. He assigns as his reasons that these two divisions are the only ones connected with the locality that will be benefited by the expenditure; and the opinion of the Local Government Board, that the area of taxation recommended by the committee is too large.

As I shall be unable to attend the meeting of the Board on the 19th inst., perhaps I may be permitted to state in writing some of the reasons which induced your committee, appointed to consider and report on all matters connected with the erection of the pump, to recommend that the divisions of Castleboro and Killanne, as well as Killoughram, should contribute towards the payment of the cost.
