When I went to inspect the drawings & specification for the Terns water works, I found it stated in the specification and was assured by your engineer (Mr Sharpe) that the thickness of the pipe was to be five-eighths of an inch, and upon this information I sent in my tender for the works, as proof of which I beg leave to refer you to the letter accompanying my tender. I now learn that the required thickness of pipe was reduced by Mr Sharpe to five-sixteenths of an inch without any notice being given to me, as one of the Contractors who had applied for the prescribed form of tender, although your engineer must have known that this was the most important item in the entire work. In fact, a corresponding reduction in my tender would have

brought the amount down to £ 935 : 2 : 2

I have written to Mr Sharpe for some explanation of the matter but that gentleman refuses any reply. I must now, gentlemen, ask you to reconsider the tenders as I am justly entitled to the contract.
