

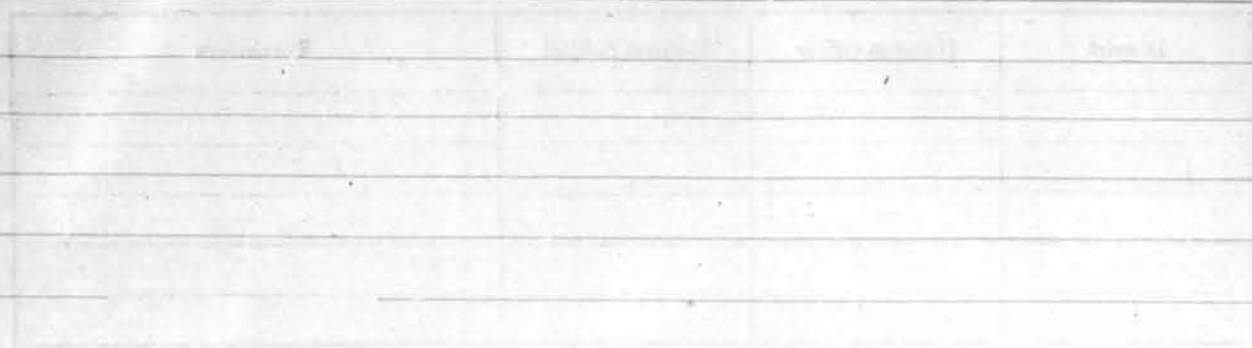

The following important letter from Dr. Kimlong was read -

To the Sanitary authority - Etc.
My Lord gentlemen

As Consulting Sanitary officer of the Union, I deem it my duty to make a few remarks relative to the Smallpox which now seems to threaten us. Two new cases have occurred during the week, one of the patients has just returned home from Fever Hospital where the Smallpox became manifest. The other case occurred in the town. The 1st case proved the absolute necessity there is to have a separate hospital for the accommodation of smallpox patients as it is manifestly unfair to ask fever patients to go in while a case of the former disease is under treatment.

I would suggest that a house in the outskirts of the town be at once got in readiness in anticipation of any emergency. It should be at a distance from any thoroughfare & of easy access to the patient, without having to pass thro the town.

The other case gives a timely warning to all, tho an adult the patient has never been vaccinated.

It might be well to recommend Vaccination under the circumstances - On the reading of this
