

Gentlemen.

Above is the list of Children born in this district since 1.12.78 and over 6 months of age, who do not appear to have been vaccinated. I notice that no return has been made to the list sent in in last January by the late Dispensary Officer so that at present I am unable to say whether any of the 98 then noticed have been since vaccinated (with the exception of I think six whose names I find either in the death register of the district, or in the vaccination Register. We are directed by the order of the Local Government Board, which your clerk Mr. Keohler forwarded to me last week, to see that every case noticed by your officers, and not vaccinated is followed up. Therefore I respectfully submit that we the medical Officers should be furnished with an individual report on each case, so that we may be able to comply with the L.G.B. order. I therefore pray that you will make the necessary order in this matter. I find on looking over the Birth Register of this district that there are but two Births registered as having taken place in the district, and only 2 Births in the Island Road. Now these are two of the most populous streets in the town and I think there must be some mistake or the children born must not be registered. Therefore we cannot know if they have been vaccinated. I beg that this matter will be looked into, as if an epidemic visited the town I do not see what is to prevent a high death rate amongst the unvaccinated children of the district.

The Report of the Committee appointed to enquire into the cause of the increased expenditure of the Union demands a few words of explanation on my part - In the first place the non allusion in the Report to the relative fixed scale of dietary for all the adults in the House during the respective years, makes me believe that a very important and necessary item of increase has been accidentally overlooked - In other words your Committee did not state whether they were satisfied with the dietary received by the Inmates during the former years. It will be well remembered that during that time, and indeed until a much more recent period, most of the Inmates lived on the almost famine allowance of two meals a day - In fact they received neither food nor drink from a two O.C. dinner until breakfast time next day - The addition therefore of a third meal to several hundred individuals is I should think a very satisfactory cause for some of the increase and be it remembered that this addition has had the full sanction of the Board. 
A Report of your Committee appointed to investigate the cause of the increased expenditure of the House has gone on the minutes and as usual has reached the public through the local press. That Report embodies a statement tantamount to a charge of lavish expenditure in the Hospital and therefore very seriously affects me both with the public and the Local Government Board - on Thursday last - the earliest possible opportunity. I felt bound to state a few facts on my Journal in order to counteract the injurious impression the Report must have generated against me. The facts which can be fully verified from the Books of the Establishment indicate the real cause of the increased expenditure and I regret I had not the privilege of pointing them ^{out} to your Committee. Can it be wondered at therefore that I felt both surprised and aggrieved at finding my report marked by the Chairman of the day - The reading of this Report was deferred until this day three weeks when the whole report will be considered not to be read for three weeks. I fear this would give ample time to the Local Government Board and to the public to form a judgement against me which might not be afterwards altered.

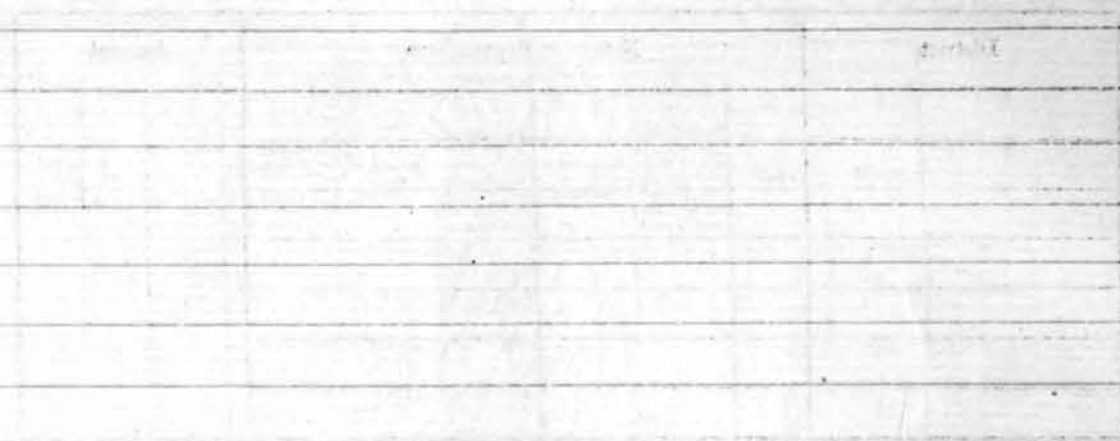
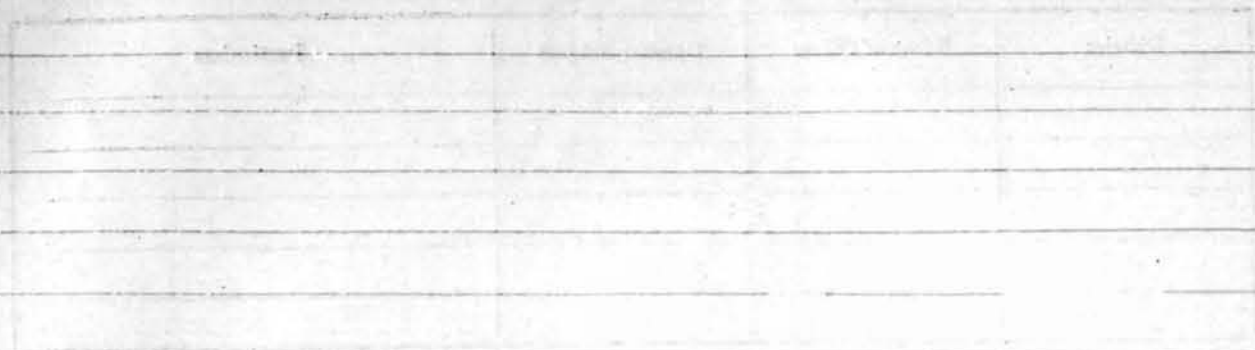
