My Lord & Gentlemen

A severe cold prevents
my going before your Board personally on
Thursday, as I had intended.
I therefore ask permission to make a statement
in writing; you are doubtless aware that
Mr O'Shaughnessy has had a claim inserted in the
Relief of Distress (Ireland) Bill to the effect,
that any Union or a part of a Union may be
scheduled as a Distressed District, and have
extended to it the right to borrow money for the
purposes of Relief. Improvement of land &c &c
should distress exist in that Union or a part of
it. In other words it is now provided that an
Electoral Division may be scheduled as distressed
even tho the Union at large be not so scheduled.
Now I wish to inform you that while there is
always a certain amount of distress at this
season among the people living along the
foot of Blackstairs and Mount Leinster there
is very much more this year than the usual
distress. I am informed that many families
living in those localities have had only one
meal a day for many weeks, and I know
from personal observation that their supply
of potatoes is now exhausted and that

unless these poor people can now be given employment on a larger scale than now seems probable they cannot possibly find money to buy meal and consequently they must starve; or become a very heavy charge indeed upon the Rates. The Revd Mr. Stenson of Templeshambo the Revd Mr. Ryan of Kiltcaly Dr. Carmody the resident Medical Officer and others are ready to confirm this statement.

It seems necessary therefore that some action should at once be taken if the people in these Districts are to be kept from starvation. Perhaps I may be allowed to say that I have endeavoured to meet these difficulties by keeping some extra hands employed this Winter; but I cannot continue this much longer unless your Board puts me in a position to borrow money at a low rate of interest for the purposes of employment. There is no downright starvation in this District at present but I plainly see that we are coming to it and in order to avoid this calamity.

I venture to ask your Board to write at once to the Local Government Board to have the Electoral Divisions of Killann and Kiltcaly placed on the distressed schedule in order to enable the Landlords to borrow money for draining road making plantings &c &c and then give employment to the working classes in these Electoral Divisions and put it in their power to procure food for themselves and their families.
