## Well at Drumgould

(copy this)

To The Board of Guardians Emmisworthy Union  
Gentlemen,

In Compliance with the order  
made with regard to Dr. Kelly's report  
of the well situated in Chapel Lane  
Drumgould, we inspected it on the 18<sup>th</sup>  
Inst, and we are bound to say, that  
we found it even in a worse state than  
we expected. There is about 18 inches  
of filthiest mud in it, the surface  
water is soaking back again into the  
well through the soft earth at the entrance.  
We would recommend that the well be  
thoroughly cleaned out. the wall around  
it to be pised up and a good large  
flag placed at the entrance so that the  
stop water cannot flow back into the  
well. It would be a great improvement  
to have 2 steps from the mouth of the  
well into it. to prevent ducks or from  
getting into the well.

We also inspected the Reservoir and found  
it in an abominable dirty state  
the supply of water being small (not  
more than 2 or 3 feet) enormous quantities  
of nasty weeds growing in it, and in  
several places disgustingly filthy matter  
flowing into it through the banks and  
in one instance through a pipe.  
We filled a small bottle of the water  
flowing into it through this pipe  
and handed it to the Chairman  
of the Town Commissioners, in order



that the immediate attention of the water committee be given to this very important matter.

We are of opinion that it will be necessary to have the Reservoir entirely cleared out, which can very easily be done now that the water is so very low.
