My Lord & Gentlemen
In compliance with the order of the Local Government Board circular dated 24th June 1880 No 538 M/80. I beg to inform you that I have been called on to attend a number of families suffering from Scarlatina, 12 cases in all, at Lomnastoley, Garryville and Garryduff. I expect that the other children of the same families will also take the disease. As I was not called in in time to isolate them from those affected, but I have taken every precaution to prevent the further spread of the disease in the district. The School at Bolavogue has been closed by order of the parish priest and I have cautioned the parents to prevent people from going into the houses. I did not say anything about sending the cases into the fever hospital at Enniscorthy. As I considered that such a step might lead to the introduction of the disease into the town, and the people had ample accommodation at home. I have forwarded a similar report
