In reference to the case of *Doyle and others v Weston* in which the Guardians desire to institute proceedings for a penalty I am of opinion that the Plaintiffs in that spectment not having given to the Relieving Officer of the Electoral Division "in which the lands are situated" the notice required by the Statute in the manner provided, incurred the penalty of £20 imposed by the 11 & 12 Vic. C. 47 and may be sued for such penalty by the Guardians either in the High Court of Justice or in the Circuit or County of the County in which they reside. I apprehend the Guardians will consider the most convenient tribunal will be the Circuit Bench Court. Two of the Plaintiffs reside in the Queen's

Kingstown in the County of Dublin. It will be desirable to select the last against whom to enforce the penalty as it will be more convenient for the witnesses to attend at Kingstown than in the Queen's County.
