June Parliamentary Notes

The following resolution was passed on the motion of Mr. P. Cullin, seconded by Mr. E. Power:—

Resolved—That as the 1st July is the last day for receiving rates without disfranchising the electors from asserting their rights in voting at the next Parliamentary Election, we, the Guardians, call on the Collectors to use all powers towards the collection of the poor rates, as they are the primary means of not having the votes broken; and should the Guardians be made aware of any neglect on the part of the Collectors, they shall feel very dissatisfied, and shall on them to give a statement of the facts. We also call on the Clerk of the Union to issue advertisements in the *Guardian* and *People* newspapers telling the ratepayers that should their rates not be paid before the 1st July their vote will be broken for the election of members of Parliament, and also that a committee of five Guardians be formed to attend at the Board-room on the day of the annual revision of Parliamentary votes, the Clerk to notify this committee the day on which such revision shall take place; and we also invite the aid of the *People* reporter to take down the objections, &c.
