It also embitters the relations previously existing between landlords and tenants. It also encourages landlords to take the most costly proceedings against their tenants for the recovery of all rent and arrears up to the date of fixing a fair rent, no matter how long delayed or how unjust the rent. Tenants are also deterred from applying to the Court from the above causes, and from their inability to pay up all arrears. We earnestly recommend that all judicial rents should date from the next gale day, after notice being served by the tenants, which would cause landlords to settle with their tenants out of Court. We also believe tenants should reap the full benefit of their own improvements for length of enjoyment cannot make them the property of the landlords. Leaseholders should not be exempt from this Act when they can satisfy the Court their rent is a rack-rent. We further believe that an Occupying Proprietary is the only final settlement of the Land Question in Ireland.


