

# Medical Officers Report

With regard to the advisability of changing the position of the lying-in ward, I have to state that on last Thursday, I had to attend for many and urgent reasons it would meet my warmest recommendation. In the first place, the Hospital accommodation at the present time is always deficient. Secondly, at the present time we have no small ward for the treatment of special cases that cannot be dealt with in crowded rooms. Thirdly, in the present position the lying-in ward is a great inconvenience in passing through the Hospital. Fourthly, the patients for the lying-in ward are, up to the time of their illness, in one of the women's dormitories, and it is both highly inconvenient and injurious to them to have them removed such a distance, usually, too, in the middle of the night. Fifthly, the midwife being an extra, it will be much more convenient for her and for all concerned to have the maternity ward near the entrance. Lastly, and most important of all, is the great disturbance it must be to the sick and dying to have patients and nurses and others coming and breaking their sleep at night.
