

A Special meeting of the *Enniscorthy* District was held Jan<sup>r</sup> 25<sup>th</sup> for the purpose of considering a letter from the L.G.B. on the subject of Dr Kelly's election.

Also present—Rev. D.O'Connor, Adm., Messrs G. Hore, J. Flynn, T. Mernagh, J. Malone, M. Kelly, P. Ryan, E. Keating, T. O'Farrell, P. W. Casey, M. Sutton, P. M. Cooke, T. Ponder and H. Goodison. Dr. Kelly was also in attendance.

The following resolution was proposed by Rev. D.O'Connor - Seconded by Mr. O'Farrell

Resolved—That "existing arrangements" are generally adhered to, only as long as they are found efficient, and practically useful; that such arrangements are constantly altered or modified in every free managing committee, and that it was the disturbing of existing arrangements, on the death of the late medical officer, Dr. Goodison, seriously affecting the status of his successor, that compels the committee to make other arrangements now.

That the committee, by a majority of seventeen to eight, have elected Dr. Kelly, not for two districts, but for the two divisions of the one Dispensary District of Enniscorthy, and that they are convinced of his willingness and ability to discharge the duties of both divisions as he has hitherto done, for the advantage of the poor, and the entire satisfaction of the committee.

That the object of the committee in uniting the two divisions of the Enniscorthy district under one medical officer, is, that they may place their officer in a position that will enable him to dispense in a great measure with private practice and thereby permit him, as sanitary officer, to enforce the laws of sanitation without the obvious difficulty of having to report on private patients, and, as dispensary doctor, to devote his undivided attention to the wants of the dispensary poor.

That in the opinion of the committee, the area of a dispensary district is, oftentimes, more important in calculating the medical officer's duty than mere statements of population, as it is manifest that twenty dispensary calls may be attended in a small town, with less time and labour than might be required for the proper treatment of two patients in an outlying district and five miles asunder.

That as more than three-fourths of the dispensary calls of both divisions of the Enniscorthy district lie within a radius of one mile of Dr Kelly's residence, and as the Local Government Board have already recognised the competency of one medical officer to discharge the duties of Wexford with a population of 16,000, and of Dundalk with over 17,000, there seems no valid reason why we should have two medical officers in this district with a population only of 12,000. As Dr Kelly's supporters are the guardians of the different districts, living amongst the poor and acquainted with their necessities, they ought to be the best judges as to what may be best for the interests of those whose guardians they are.

Therefore, we, the majority, confidently appeal to the disinterested fairness of the Local Government Board to uphold the law, by sanctioning Dr. Kelly's legal appointment, as otherwise we should be compelled to regard the office of the committee as superseded, and the majority subservient to the minority.
