ENNISCORTHY DISTRICT.

A meeting of the Committee of Management of the above Dispensary District was held on the 22nd Instant, for the purpose of considering a letter from the Local Government Board regarding the appointment of Dr. Kelly, to the duties of Nos. 1 and 2 divisions.

Present:—Mr. John Flynn, (in the chair); Rev. D. O'Connor, Messrs. G. Hore, M. Kelly, Thomas Merna, John Murphy, P. W. Casey, James Malone, P. M. Cooke, Peter Carty, Patrick Ryan, Captain Murphy.

The following is the letter referred to:—

"Sir—The Local Government Board for Ireland desire to inform the committee of management of the Ennisorthy Dispensary District, that they have under consideration the resolution which was adopted by the majority of the committee at their meeting on 25th ult., in support of the proposition that Dr. Kelly should for the future act as medical officer for No. 2 dispensary in addition to No. 1. The Local Government Board have to point out to the committee that by Sealed Order dated 24th Feb. 1852, the number of medical officers for Ennisorthy Dispensary was fixed at two, and that no departure from this order could be made by the committee unless that order be withdrawn or amended by the Local Government Board. Therefore the arrangement proposed by the committee cannot be carried out in the manner desired, but, if the committee still think that one medical officer can discharge the whole duty of the Ennisorthy Dispensary District the board would be willing to amend the order accordingly as the population of Ennisorthy has decreased since 1852. Under such circumstances it would be for the Board of Guardians, subject to the approval of the Local Government Board, to reduce the salary which shall be paid to the medical officer. Having regard to the increased duties the Local Government Board think it right to state, at once, that they would not sanction a medical officer being paid £200 a year, which is very much above the rate of remuneration for similar duties in other unions. The Local Government Board request that they may be informed whether the committee now desire that they should amend the order above referred to, and authorise the employment of only one medical officer in the Ennisorthy district, at such reasonable salary as the Local Government Board may approve or determine, under the provision of the 8th section of the Medical Charities Act, or whether the committee wish to adhere to the arrangements prescribed by the existing Order, and appoint a second medical officer, and the Local Government Board request that a meeting of the committee may be convened to consider the subject.

The following resolution was proposed by Rev. D. O'Connor, seconded by Mr. T. O'Farrell, and passed unanimously:—

1.—That the warmest acknowledgements of this Committee are due to the Local Government Board for their kindness in amending the standing sealed order, in reference to Dr. Kelly's election, and that the Local Government Board be respectfully solicited to make the required changes, that will enable them to place the two divisions of this district under the charge of one medical officer.

2.—That as the salary paid to the Medical Officer is in no sense a personal gift, but a remuneration for work done, and as the duties of this united district will require the full time and labour of the Medical Officer, we think any reduction of the salary for such sacrifices, not only unreasonable but unfair.

3.—That as no member of the committee has, at any time, made any move for the reduction of the Medical Officer's salary, and as, in point of fact, no reduction would have been made or asked, had this district remained as before, under two Medical Officers, we could not reduce the salary now without leaving ourselves open to the charge of acting through unworthy personal motives, and of being prepared to give for the self-same duties, a greater salary to two than to one Medical Officer.

4.—That as the object of the committee in requesting the Local Government Board to place this united district under one Medical Officer is, that being more independent of private practice, he may be at liberty to give more special attention to the wants of the poor, we think the suggestion of the Local Government Board in reference to salary would frustrate that object, since a reduced salary, together with the absence of Registration Fees would, in a pecuniary point of view, place Dr. Kelly in a position below the average of most of the Medical Officers of Ireland.

5.—That as the amount, which could be deducted from the salary of the Medical Officer, would be absolutely insignificant in comparison to a conscientious and faithful fulfilment of the onerous medical duties of the united district, and as the committee have assumed to itself the responsibility and full confidence in Dr. Kelly's ability and willingness to perform these duties in a faithful and conscientious manner, we hope the Local Government Board will be able to coincide with us in the opinion that it is inexpedient at present to make any change in the salary of the Medical Officer.
