I regret to state that a man named Robert Livingston admitted here on the 1st inst who it appears was of unsound mind, committed suicide in the male Idiot ward on Sunday morning last by hanging himself with the Window cord. I saw him twice myself on Saturday evening last and the paid Wardsman (Sinnott) saw him to bed at 7 o'clock and visited him again after 8 o'clock P.M. and was speaking to him after 9 o'clock, he nor I had not the least suspicion of anything being wrong with him, particularly as I have known him for the last 40 years, and always considered him capable of taking care of himself. There was an Idiot sleeping in same cell with deceased who did not give the least alarm. A Patient named (Connors) who occupied the next cell heard him speaking some time after day light on Sunday morning but did not know what he was saying. An Inquest was held on the Body of deceased on Monday last and a Verdict returned that death was caused by "strangulation". The jury were of opinion that there was no blame attached to any person concerned —

but condemned the mode of opening the Windows by a cord, as they considered it afforded facilities for deceased to commit the Act.

The Jury also recommended a night Watchman to be appointed, I therefore consider it necessary that a Committee be appointed to inspect said Windows and give directions thereon.
