

## CLONROCHE DISPENSARY COMMITTEE.

At a special meeting of this Committee held on 9th July to consider the sanitary state of Bree—members present—Mr. D. Coates, Mr. P. Keating, Mr. Doran, Mr. Robinson, and Mr. Maurice Murphy in the chair—the following resolution was unanimously adopted:—

That we recommend the privy belonging to the National School be cleansed and closed without delay, and we further recommend that the Sanitary Medical Officer be requested to have our instructions carried out forthwith, and that he be allowed all necessary expenses. And we further had under consideration the letter signed Thomas Kirwan referred to our Committee by the Board of Guardians on the 19th June.

Proposed by Mr. Robinson, seconded by Mr. Coates, and passed unanimously—That we have read the letter of Thomas Kirwan, Bree, to the Guardians, with regard to Dr. Stock. Kirwan admits that Dr. Stock told him the girl ought to be removed to the Hospital, but that he (Kirwan) did not ask the Dr. what her disease was. Dr. Stock states that he told his (Kirwan's) wife, also the Parish Priest her disease, and also that he desired a Mrs. Doyle and a Mrs. Kennedy not to go to the house. We regret that any misunderstanding should have taken place, but we do not attach any blame. And we had further under consideration the burning of Martin Doyle's clothes, and taking into consideration the virulence of the disease, and the smallness of his dwelling, we are of opinion and we strongly recommend that Doyle be compensated for the amount of clothes burned.
