

Mr. FRANCIS CULLEN, of Killisk.

I beg to give Notice that on this day three weeks I will ask the Board to consider the conduct of our Clerk for sending Union printing to the Watchman Office under the following facts:—Advertisements were issued that Tenders would be received by the Board on May 23rd, 1883, and that Printing would be contracted for as set forth in Alexander Thom's Catalogue. The tender of the Watchman Office was before the Board, and had not one to propose it. In the face of that our Clerk sent the Union advertisements to be printed to the Watchman Office, thereby knowingly putting additional cost on the Union without the orders of the Board. Also, for sending Printing that was contracted for at Thom's list of prices to the Watchman Office to be printed, thereby knowingly depriving the contractor of the use of his contract, as well as ignoring the acts of the Board without its orders. From the above acts we have no confidence in our Clerk, and in the discharge of our duty we respectfully ask the Local Government Board to call on the Clerk to resign.

Mr. Cullen's resolutions

Sandymount, September 10, 1884.
To the Chairman of the Enniscorthy Board of Guardians

Sir—As Mr. Cullen has chosen, with such good taste, the time of my annual holiday, to make a most unfeeling and unprovoked attack on me, I am forced to trouble the Board with a written explanation of the true state of the case, lest it should mislead in ignorance.

Mr. Cullen has been for some time in correspondence with the Local Government Board on these matters, but not contented, I presume, with the satisfaction he received in that quarter, he now asks the local Board to "back him up" in his special mission of "crushing the Clerk." I am greatly mistaken however if the Board will lend itself to such a vindictive and unjust proceeding.

Now, Sir, as to details. In the first notice of motion, there are three totally distinct and separate matters, which are adroitly jumbled up together by Mr. Cullen to serve his own purposes, and to lead the Board astray. These must be dealt with, one by one, to be understood. First, as to the advertisements given by me to the "Watchman" from May, '83, to May, '84, the case stands thus:—The two local papers, the "News" and the "Watchman," have been receiving, as a matter of course, for over 25 years, the advertisements of the Union, without special contracts. On July, 13th, '82, however, Mr. O'Farrell proposed, without notice, a resolution which was adopted by the Board, viz., "That for the future no advertisements from this Union be inserted in the 'Enniscorthy Watchman.'" I accordingly refrained from giving advertisements to the "Watchman," till on the 10th of May, '83, the following resolution of which a fortnight's notice had been given to each Guardian was adopted by 22 votes to 21, viz.—"That the resolution of the 13th July, '82, in reference to the advertising in the 'Enniscorthy Watchman Newspaper' be rescinded." A majority of 1 is as valid to legalize a motion as 21, and I accordingly resumed giving the advertisements to the "Watchman." For thus obeying a distinct resolution of the Board I am held up to odium by Mr. Cullen, and he has the audacity to ask the Board to declare me unworthy its confidence. This, so far, is as clear as noonday; but further, what will be said of Mr. Cullen's version of the "facts" when I state that the "tenders received by the Board on May 23rd" to which he refers, were not for the ordinary advertisements of the Union at all, and had no reference whatever to them. They were for the printing of circulars, out-door relief names, and jurors' lists. I am accused of putting additional cost on the Union. I am obliged now, in self defence, to ask, who does this, "with a vengeance," in this matter of printing? Who gives Mr. Walsh, of Wexford, £12 16s. 8d. for printing the jurors' lists, that Mr. Griffith offered to do for £6? Who gives Mr. Walsh £15 6s. 10d. for the insertion of out-door relief lists, which Mr. Griffith offered to do for £7 13s. 5d.? Who gives £13 to Mr. Walsh for advertisements in "The People" for one year, being £7 18s. 4d. in excess of charge for insertion in "Watchman." Who pays, without a murmur, as well, for advertisements in the "Guardian" newspaper for one year an excess of £2 12s. 6d. over "Watchman" prices? and on the bill for circulars £3 4s. 9d., making a total, in one year, of net excess paid to Mr. Walsh of £23 4s. May I ask, why does Mr. Cullen aid, abet, or sanction these "additional costs" to the Union. The unfortunate ratepayers are dragged in, and his sympathy appealed to, to damage me, but is complacently and easily ignored when it suits.

Now, Sir, for the second count in the indictment, viz.—the ordering of voting papers, at the election of Guardians, from Mr. Griffiths. This, I admit, at once, I did, on my own responsibility, and acting in my capacity as Returning Officer. The issue here is very simple. I either had no right to do this, or I had. If I had no right to do it, I am quite prepared to pay over to Mr. Walsh the proportion of profit he may claim, as lost by him, on account of my action. But, I submit, I am within my right in getting these forms where it suits me best. In the circular of instructions sent to me as Returning Officer by the Local Government Board it is stated "the forms can be procured from Messrs. Thom & Co., Dublin, but should you employ any other printer, it will be necessary for you to compare the several forms carefully with those prescribed in the general order, as you will be responsible for their accuracy." Truly, a nice position I would be in, with contests in 13 Electoral Divisions to prepare for, in less than as many days, if I were compelled to get voting papers, either 78 miles away, to please the Local Government Board, or 18 miles away, to please a few of the Guardians. I would most unhesitatingly decline to be "responsible" for printing done in either Dublin or Wexford without my own power of revision, or for the eccentricities of carriage. (As an instance of the latter I may mention that the Estimate of Rates lately sent me on a Friday from the "People" Office in Wexford, did not reach me till 12 o'clock noon on the following Monday.) Having taken these things into consideration, I decided not to risk anything, but to obtain the necessary papers at home from a man whom I never knew to desert me on a pinch and who could always be relied on, in an emergency. With the politics of the "Watchman" I have nothing to do, they are no concern of mine, but of Mr. Griffiths as a printer, I feel bound to say that a more satisfactory, obliging and honorable man it would be hard to meet. I therefore felt safe in his hands, having all the printing I required under my thumb as it were, and capable of being altered or amended to suit the varying requirements of the hour.

I now come to the 3rd count in this long indictment, as preferred in notice of motion No. 2. This is easily dealt with. It will, no doubt, surprise the Board to be told that there is no error whatever either in my replies to the queries asked or in the abstracts of the Union. Both are correct. The £211 2s. 9d. referred to was received for sale of farm produce and other things, and was correctly credited direct to the establishment and other accounts and does not appear on the upper part of the abstract. If Mr. Cullen had looked below, however, he would have seen the farm given credit for its share and the amount deducted from the general charges of the establishment. I included correctly this £211 2s. 9d. in my reply as to the gross receipts lodged with Treasurer as asked for. If I had not done so, then, indeed, Mr. Cullen would have had some groundwork for a charge against me, but as it now stands, what defence has he? He has, in his anxiety to damage me, promulgated a false and malicious libel against me, aggravated by an unreported statement at the Board when handing in his notice of motion, to the effect that I had given false information to the Board to mislead it, knowing it to be so. I am not aware of anything in my conduct to Mr. Cullen to warrant such a vindictive proceeding against me on his part, and I feel confident that the Board will not approve of it or endorse it.—I am, Sir, your obedient servant,







MALE AND FEMALE SCHOOLS.
The following observations on the state of these
schools were made by Mr. P. T. Macauley at his
recent inspection:—
Male School.—The answering of the pupils ex-
amined was quite satisfactory. Reading very good
writing and spelling particularly good, when the
ages of the children are considered. The school-
room is clean and well ventilated. As the atten-
dance at this season of the year is so small, it is
intended to hold the annual examination in Janu-
ary or February, when a larger number may be
expected to be in the house.
Female School.—The number presented for ex-
amination was very small. The pupils examined
were well prepared. The teacher continues to
give satisfaction by her management of the school
and the care and attention given to the children.
It would add considerably to the comfort of the
children if a back rail were fixed upon the seats
as a support for their back and shoulders, their
present tendency is to lean forward on the desks.
This encourages a crouching attitude, which is
injurious to both their health and appearance. I
expect in future to examine this school at a ses-
sion when the attendance is likely to be larger—
January or February.

In reference to the late bread and meal contract, the board beg to state that Mr. O. Connolly, the old contractor, gave great satisfaction by the superior quality of bread he supplied the workhouse. Therefore, when tenders for bread and meal were opened (there were but two) the guardians honestly believed, from information derived from bakery, that a wholesome and sound article of bread could not be supplied at a less price than 5d. per 4lb. loaf. This board is aware that it cost the Wexford Union a fraction over 5d. per 4lb. loaf, and in the interest of the poor (bread and meal being an essential article of diet) they felt conscientiously obliged to give the bread and meal to the highest tender. They considered Mr. Rossiter's tender too low to ensure satisfactory results.
