IN RE JONATHAN HAUGHTON, ESQ.
The following resolution proposed by John Furlong, Esq., seconded by D. Coates, Esq., was unanimously adopted:—
"That we, the Enniscomorthy Board of Guardians, have heard with surprise and regret that Mr. Jonathan Haughton, of Bockspring, has been removed from his position of Court Valuer under the Land Commission without any reasons being given for such a proceeding, and as it is a matter of vital importance that this office should be filled by men of practical experience in agricultural affairs, we believe Mr. Haughton is in every way qualified to discharge efficiently and justly, between landlord and tenant, the duties of the situation from which he has been removed, as he is an extensive farmer and well known in this county as a thorough judge of land. His removal from office will reduce, to a great extent, any confidence which at present exists in the administration of the Land Act, as the present staff of valuers are nearly all landlords or land agents. Mr. Haughton has acted as Deputy-Vice-Chairman of this Board for many years, is on the Managing Committee of the Wexford Agricultural Society, and his conduct in these capacities has always given satisfaction to the persons concerned."
We hereby direct our Clerk to send a copy of this resolution to Mr. Redmond, M.P. for Wexford Borough, with the view of his bringing the matter before the House of Commons, in hopes that the reason of Mr. Haughton's dismissal may be elicited from the Government, and that the other Members for the County be requested to support Mr. Redmond in his exertions in the matter. Also that copies be sent to the other three Unions of the County for approval.

We consider that Lord Portsmouth's contribution to the building of it was a mere charitable gift and not an investment, and that the transaction that occurred in 1852 amounted to no more than a transfer of the management from the public to the Board of Guardians, and no way justified the imposition of rent, particularly as the other hospitals in the Union are held at a mere nominal rent; and we now request Lord Portsmouth to insist no longer upon the payment of £10, but to substitute in its stead a nominal rent, and we direct our Clerk to send copies of this resolution to Lord Portsmouth and his agent.

Proposed by Mr. Roche, seconded by Mr. B. Murphy:

Resolved—That Mr. Roberts having informed our Solicitor that the matter of the farm is in the hands of Lord Portsmouth's Law Agent, we hereby refer the matter to our Solicitor to protect our interests, with instructions that we will not pay more than the £2 an acre already offered.
