

From Newcastle in favour of county cess being paid by the landlords. Tipperary, calling on the legislature to make the Labourers Act workable and retrospective. Oldcastle, apprenticing out children, and asking the co-operation to have the Orphan and Deserted Children's Act amended. Middleton, all expenses with sanitary works and for parliamentary and jurors lists should be paid out of the Consolidated Fund, and that the poor-law should not be applied to any other purpose than poor-law. Listowel, that the Government should lend money at a low per cent. direct to tenant farmers for drainage purposes, so as to afford more extensive employment to the labourers. Mohill, protesting against the action of the House of Lords in arresting the progress of the Poor-law Guardians Bill. It is very necessary that the provisions embodied in the Bill should be strongly enforced to prevent recurrence of the reign of terror which existed previous to the formation of the late Land League. Ennistymon, that owing to the present great depression in all articles of farming produce, whereby the ratepayers are gradually being reduced to poverty, and unable to meet their demands, we consider it a duty we owe to those we represent to proclaim to the prohibition of the growth of any crop by means of which the farming interest may be enabled to compete with foreigners is both unwise and unjust. Therefore, we hereby call on the Irish representatives to combine in introducing into the next session of Parliament a bill to repeal the Act passed in the year 1831, which made it penal to cultivate tobacco in Ireland, said bill, like all things elsewhere, English interests were concerned, being a blow at the welfare of Ireland, though a gross violation of the Act of Union.

In reference to the resolution sent in on December 31st, adopted by the board, I beg to say that I have not refused hitherto, nor do I now refuse, any information at my disposal connected with the points raised by Mr. Cullen as to the Union advertisements. On the contrary, I have taken a large amount of trouble and spent many hours of valuable time in producing information for the board's perusal. I have done this the more willingly as I was confident that everything that could be forthcoming only confirmed the correctness of my conduct in the matter and the utter groundlessness of the charges brought against me by Mr. Cullen. As to the last paragraph of the resolution put by Mr. Cullen on the 27th inst. referred to, I am not clear as to what it means. I can only conjecture what Mr. Cullen meant to convey in it, and if my conjecture be correct I am unable to answer it. It is quite immaterial, however, whether it is answered or not, as even if replied to it would have no bearing whatever on the point at issue. I now lay before the board the resolution asked for of the 23rd September, 1880 (not of the 4th August, 1880, as stated), whereby the payment of a bulk sum £13 per annum to THE PEOPLE newspaper was substituted for the former plan of payment by scale or advertisement. It will be seen that there is no reference to this arrangement being a substitution in any sense for the advertisement in the local papers as well. The extract from the Minute Book is as follows:—"Page 227, THE PEOPLE newspaper—A bill for advertisements from THE PEOPLE newspaper from May 3rd, 1879, to August 18th, 1880, being laid before the board, it was ordered to be paid.
