Resolved—That having duly considered Mr. Rossiter's letter, relative to his not getting the contract for bread and provisions, his being the lowest tender, and calling for a sworn inquiry, we desire to express our opinion that we accepted Mr. Connolly's tender from samples we considered far superior to Mr. Rossiter's; and we have had experience of Mr. Connolly's provisions for the past twelve months, and can gladly assert that they were the best ever supplied to the Workhouse and have given general satisfaction. We have had this expression of satisfaction from the Master of the Workhouse and from the inmates, and while we have such a good and honest contractor, we purpose giving him the contract at a marketable and moderate price, viz.—Best white bread (for which we advertised), at 5d. per 4lb. loaf, as we considered it would be wiser for us to do so than to be running the risk of getting a in a spurious article, as was the case when we were paying others one-halfpenny and three-farthings in the 4lb. loaf more than we considered it worth. It would, in the end, be a great loss to the union to run the chance of getting bread, that he might be necessitated to have analyzed every month, as is the case in other unions, or bread that after being one day old would not be used by the inmates and should then be thrown into the swine tub, as was often the case before. As to the secondary part of Mr. Rossiter's letter, we treat it with the utmost contempt, its intention being to cast a slur on the board—to lessen if possible, by slander or otherwise, our popular, energetic and painstaking officers in whom we have the greatest confidence.

Resolved—That in view of the coming visit to Ireland of the Prince and Princess of Wales, that we, the Enniscorthy Board of Guardians, hope there shall be no funkism used on the part of the Irish people towards the Royal visitors in their starring tour through Ireland, but that they be quietly allowed to go about their business like other mortals. It is expected the capital of our country shall set an example worthy of the provinces to follow, by their manly attitude in the face of an English Prince, by which means he may know that as long as Earl Spencer and Gladstone's coercion Government strive to rule this country we shall be no syconphants.




