The Clerk's Report was read to the following effect:—

Sure New Franchise Act.

THE NEW FRANCHISE.
The Clerk read the following report which he had drawn up re the New Franchise:—
Having sent forward the list of Parliamentary Voters under the New Franchise Act to the Clerk of the Peace, I beg to lay before the Board some statistics connected therewith, which may interest both the guardians and the public. The board having appointed the collectors of poor-rate as assistant overseers, they accordingly, acting upon my instructions, distributed during the months of April and May a form to each inhabitant occupier of a dwelling-house in the union. This was done by them satisfactorily and well. To show the large amount of work thus carried out by the collectors, I may mention that M. Doyle distributed 567 notices; James Murphy, 815; E. Somers, 838; J. McDonald, 1,558; T. Nolan, 1,623; J. Walsh, 835; and J. Murphy, 874; making a total of 7,115.
Of these, 6,903 were returned duly by the householders, which evidences the large amount of interest taken by the newly-enfranchised in the matter. The balance may be accounted for by the large number of women householders in the union, who probably thought it useless to return their papers this year. Their time is coming, however; they have only to wait a little longer for a full legal recognition of their claims.
The mass of notices thus received were carefully examined, one by one, in this office with the aid of the collectors, and with the following result. Placed on the register of voters by me, as follows:—Polling district of Castlebridge, 97 names; Clonroche, 690; Enniscorthy, 2,420; Ferns, 598; Newtownbarry, 911; Oulart, 908; Taghmon, 133; Wexford, 87. Total 5,811.
In addition to those, there are 176 names from Cranmore Electoral Division, which have been returned to the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Carlow, making a gross total from this union of 5,987 names on the registers.
Of this large number, there are only 228 to whom it will be my duty to object owing to non-payment of poor-rate before the 1st day of July.
I may also mention that these figures do not include lodgers as such, only inhabitant occupiers of dwellings or separate and distinct tenements.
Lodgers simply can claim to vote, as such, before the County Court Judge with the necessary previous preliminaries to be observed.
I am sure it will be a satisfaction to the board to find such large and exceptional work done altogether by their permanent officials, without calling in any extra assistance, as in most other unions, and it is to be hoped that at the proper time, it, and the other authorities concerned, will award adequate remuneration for such laborious and exacting duties.
