## MASTER'S REPORT

The Master reported as follows:—

 The Clerk read the following report:—  
 I report having attended at Oulart Petty Sessions Court on Tuesday, the 15th inst., to prosecute in this case. Mr. Jerome Murphy, sub-sanitary officer, was also in attendance. Mr. O'Flaherty appeared on behalf of the defendant. After a long argument on both sides, the Court made an order of "No Rule" in the case. It seemed undecided as whether the term "Nuisance," in the Public Health Act, covered the defect complained of—viz., want of proper repairs. It also seemed unwilling to make the optional order to close the houses referred to, as neither side urged this on the present occasion. If now remains for the Sanitary Authority to decide as to the course to be adopted. It can instruct its solicitor to appeal against this decision to the Court of Quarter Sessions, in which case notice of appeal must be made within fourteen days from date of order made by Petty Sessions Court. It may be again proceeded with in Petty Sessions Court, asking for an order to have said houses closed as unfit for human habitation, making the occupier defendant. The Board will decide which course it will pursue.
