Mr. Finlay, auditor, wrote—

I have received your letter on the 3rd inst., forwarding copy of a resolution, in which information is requested respecting an alleged discrepancy of £2 10s. in the documents, for the half-year ended 25th March, 1884. I hope you will endeavour to satisfy the guardians respecting this small matter. Should you not succeed and it become necessary for me to render assistance, I shall do so if the guardian or guardians moving in this matter will attend at the next audit of the union accounts.
