In reply to the letter of the Local Government Board of the 18th ult., in reference to the union accounts, we beg to inform them that the matter was before the auditor on the 13th of February, 1885, and we enclose his replies, together with the queries by him. Feeling dissatisfied with those replies, the board again directed attention to the subject on the 16th July following, when our clerk referred the matter to the auditor, before whom it was laid for a second time on 1st August last, in order to explain the discrepancy of £11 3s. found to exist in the abstracts of the union for March half-year, 1884, and the abridgment of the accounts of same date previously furnished by the auditor to us. The sum of £12 10s. paid by Gorey Union to us in support of Oulart Fever Hospital was brought forward for the prior half year, September 1883, and set down, less by £1 7s. received by us for bones and rags, by the auditor as a credible explanation. This method of balancing the accounts of the Union we do not hesitate to characterize as unsatisfactory and highly objectionable. The accounts of a given period, to be in any measure true and reliable, must not contain an entry of any items which does not actually exist during the time covered by those accounts. The abstracts of March half-year are either true and reliable, or they are not. If true, we cannot comprehend why they cannot be balanced without the aid of an important item found only in the accounts of another half-year which had been certified by the auditor to be a true statement of the financial condition of the Union. If, on the other hand, an inquiry into these accounts at the hands of the Local Government Board is due to us as guardians of the interests of the ratepayers. Believing that important considerations are involved in the issue, and feeling impelled by duty to push the subject to a definite conclusion, we again press on the Local Government Board the absolute necessity of granting a searching and impartial inquiry into this portion of the Union accounts to which their attention has been repeatedly directed."







RE MY COSTS.

Enniscorthy, 29th Dec., 1885.

DEAR SIR—The request contained in the resolution transmitted to me on the 17th inst. asking me "to reduce my account by amount paid printers in excess for advertisements" is highly unreasonable, and founded upon an eminently vicious principle, which, I am sure, the board will hasten to repudiate as soon as it is pointed out to them. Not the least part of the unreasonableness consists in their first paying the demand themselves, and so precluding all question of its particulars, and then calmly asking me blindfolded to indemnify them against a claim that I have never seen. This goes far to show that the resolution was inconsiderately passed without due deliberation, and for that reason alone it ought not to be maintained.

But this affair, after all, is a mere detail compared with the new principle that it seeks to establish in the relation between solicitor and client—namely, that the solicitor is to pay the expense of being particularly careful. In the administration of an Act of Parliament just recently passed incorporating two separate codes of a most complex character—the Lands and Railways Clauses Acts and the Sanitary Acts—involving the application of novel and unfamiliar principles and procedure, and abounding in minute detail, the neglect or loose observance of which might at any stage discover a pitfall to wreck the schemes, a solicitor takes anxious care to adhere strictly to the provisions of the statutes and to follow the best authorities in the

country. After the event his client thinks, or rather one of those plagues of society, an officious meddler, puts it into his head, that some expense might have been avoided if less particularity and a looser practice had prevailed; and then, forsooth, the solicitor must be called upon to pay for his extreme care! Would any client in his senses deal with his solicitor on such a principle? or would any solicitor that valued his professional character deal with a client who insisted upon its application? And surely rules of conduct that obtain with men of sense in their private affairs are sufficiently safe guides for poor-law guardians as well as other trustees. It is only necessary to state the principle in terms in order to secure its refutation in all reasonable minds. Indeed I have no reason in my dealings with the board up to this to think that they ever act on it themselves, for they have always sought my services with a readiness that showed not only that they were actuated by a desire that the benefits of the statute should be secured to the labourers without stint, but that they were determined that the proceedings should be carried through with an exactness that would defy the efforts of owners or occupiers to pick holes in them. In conclusion, there being no possible objection to the amount certified by the taxing officer to be due to me, the money being estimated for in the loan now lying fruitless in bank, there can be no reason in law or morals for delaying payment for one hour. I think it was your chairman observed at one of the meetings that the ratepayers were "not satisfied." I call upon him to name them, and I defy him to mention a respectable ratepayer in the community who is not crying shame upon the meanness that in this instance is seeking to deprive the labourer of his hire.—Your obedient servant,

Workhouse Farm

JUDGMENT IN THE LAND CASE.
A letter was read from Mr. O'Dempsey, solicitor, enclosing the following decision given by Mr. Reeves, Land Commissioner, in the claim of The Poor Law Guardians of the Enniscorthy Union, tenants; Lord Portmouth, landlord.
The Guardians of the Enniscorthy Union have served an originating notice to fix a fair rent on the workhouse farm, which they held as tenants from year to year under Lord Portmouth. The farm contains a little more than 21 acres Irish plantation measure, and the rent is at the rate of £4 the Irish acre. Between the years 1849 and 1853 the guardians purchased six small plots of ground from the then owners, who, at the time of such purchase, were not farmers, but persons residing in Enniscorthy and using those plots as accommodation land; and it also appears that for a very long series of years the rent of these plots was (with one exception) the present rent at the time of their purchase. We think, both from the documentary and oral evidence which was presented to us, that these holdings have, and now bear an increased value as accommodation land over and above the ordinary letting value of land occupied as a farm; that they have, adjoining the town of Enniscorthy, and in the occupation of persons living in that town, and therefore, in every respect townparks within the 53th section (sub-section 2) of the Land Act of 1881. The question then remains whether the farm in its present condition, and under its altered circumstances, is still to be considered to be within the same exception. Since the year 1853 the farm, consisting in its aggregate of the above small lots, has been used as a workhouse farm. The available pauper labour, supplemented by paid labour, in some instances has been utilised in its working, and the produce has been partly used for the accommodation and supply of the workhouse, and partly sold in the public market. The guardians have farmed the land carefully, and much improved its condition. If the matter came before us as a *res integra*, we should hold that the land, having been so long used as an ordinary farm of considerable size (21 acres Irish), had lost its character of town park, and that the fair rent should have been fixed. We think, however, that we are coerced by authority to exclude the farm from the operation of the Act. The cases of *Killoen v. Lambert*, *Trustees of St. Kierans College v. Sir R. Musgrave*, and the Guardians of the Limavaddy Union v. Tyler (which was the very case of a workhouse farm) appear to us fatal to the guardians' contention. The first-named case appears to establish the principle that once the three statutory disqualifications are proved to exist it is immaterial whether the land is farmed as an ordinary agricultural holding, or used for the accommodation of a town residence. In conclusion, it is only to be remarked that the authority in the Exchequer reports, cited by Mr. Lynch in his able argument, coupled with the conclusion of the 57th section of the Act of 1881, and the 70th section of the Act of 1870, defining the term "person," establish as a matter of law that the guardians, for the purpose of the argument, must be held to live in the workhouse, where the business of the union is carried on, and there can be no doubt that the workhouse is in the town of Enniscorthy, with suburbs thereon.


