The following was read from the Clerk of Works :—
GENTLEMEN—I beg leave to lay the following report
before you for your consideration. The three houses
in Ballyhogue are finished and occupied. In Ballyhuskard
three houses are finished, if they meet the approval of the
committee appointed to inspect them by the board. In
Ballyvaldon two houses are nearly completed. I must
remark that the construction and workmanship of those
houses are of a superior quality, and far exceeds what
is required by the plan and specification, which, I think,
is creditable to the contractor, Mr. T. Dempsey. In
Boleboy three houses, two of which are nearly completed.
Mr. N. Fortune is the contractor. I must also remark
that the workmanship on those houses is of a superior
quality, and will compare favourably with any other
houses in the union. I must also report that the three
other houses in the Boleboy Division, contracted for by
Mr. Samuel Hawkins, are not being proceeded with at
present, although I noticed him to go on with the work
according to the instructions of the board. He is now
engaged at the house in Tinacross. In Bree one house,
which is occupied for some time. Mr. N. Wickham is the
contractor. I visited this house lately at the request of a
guardian, and found some damage done by the late storm.
One ridge-tile was blown down, and an eave-shoot was also
blown down and broken. The concrete floor was broken
in several places, by whom I cannot say. I notified the
contractor of these defects, and requested him to have
them repaired. In Castletalbot four houses are finished.
I must also say that they are a credit to the contractor,
Mr. John Bolger. In Castledockrill there are two houses
finished, and occupied. Mr. J. Shanahan, contractor.
In Castle Ellis, three houses; nothing done yet. Mr.
Thomas Dempsey, contractor. In Clonroche there are
nine houses nearly completed. I must also say, to the best
of my judgment, the two contractors in this division are
doing their work in a satisfactory manner. In Ederville
seven houses are completed, and I believe are now occupied.
In Enniscorthy four houses, two of which are completed,
the other two not yet commenced. In Kilmallock three
houses, one not yet commenced. Mr. James Connolly is
the contractor. I found, on inspecting house, No. 54,
belonging to this contractor, that the privy and ashpit
were badly built, seemingly not done by a tradesman.
The work is not square, as the front wall is eight inches
longer than back wall, and not plumb. I pointed out
those defects to the contractor. In Kilrush there is one
house finished and occupied. In St. Mary's, one house
finished and occupied. Tinacross, one house, Mr. Samuel
Hawkins contractor, now building. The Leap, six houses;
three finished and occupied, three nothing done to yet.
Mr. Nicholas Wickham contractor. I must also inform
the board that there are ten houses for which there is not
a stone laid yet—one in Castletalbot, three in Castle Ellis,
two in Enniscorthy, one in Kilmallock, and three in The
Leap. I would also wish to impress on the board the
great necessity to have the work commenced immediately,
as this is the proper season. The board are also aware that
some of those contracts were entered into six months ago.
