The committee failed to discover that the exposed wood work got two coats of paint the first a dark priming of lamp black and white lead. I also admit the houses got but one coat of dashing but were previously plastered and floated which the committee did not report which is now knocked down and repaired and not sound. I would request the Board to report the specification where the Sanitary Authority need not pay without calling on their engineer.

if they think fit to inspect the Works. I would earnestly request the Board to call on their Engineer to inspect the works or some competent person outside who will not be interested as I believe a spirit of disunion exists in the Locality for some time in connection with those houses which the public press can testify - I would be anxious the Guardians would go and see for themselves as there is many would be but defeated tenants in many divisions of the Union who are using absurd ~~and unfounded~~ <sup>or unfounded</sup> recitals to the public generally in connection with those houses without any experience or judgement whatever.




