That in reply to the letter of the Local Government Board, we beg to state that we fully considered the duties of registrar under the Compulsory Vaccination Acts, as shown after B in the duties of registrar in the committee books, dated the 3rd November, 1885, sent to us for our guidance by the Local Government Board; also, section 8 of Compulsory Vaccination Act, 26 and 27 Vic., cap. 52, 13th July, 1863; also a circular from Poor-law Commissioners' Office, Dublin, 10th August, 1863, which say the other duties to be performed under the Act are to be performed by the registrar of births and deaths. From the above we are of opinion it is the registrar's duty to do what he is paid for, and if any registrar feel that he wants a deputy, he can pay him out of the fees allowed to him by the Act, as we could not continue paying the second party at the expense of the already overtaxed ratepayers, which appears to us would be contrary to the rules laid down for our guidance. As we ordered the relieving-officers to perform the duty for the last year of serving notice on defaulters under the Vaccination Act, we thought it our duty to order them payment.
