REV. MR. MURDOCH'S LETTER.

The Clerk read the following letter from Rev. Canon Murdoch, Protestant chaplain:—

The Rectory, Enniscorthy, Nov. 17th, 1886.
DEAR SIR—On my return home on Saturday last, I found your note enclosing a resolution of the Board of Guardians appointing me, with others, to serve on a committee to investigate the circumstances of the Simpson affair, and directing you to communicate with "chaplains as to the most convenient and suitable day to hold the inquiry." I had already been sent a copy of that resolution a few days before, when on my way home. When I first read it I was deeply impressed with what seemed to me the very fair and liberal manner in which that committee was constituted—something more than fair and liberal—it was generous in its fairness and liberality; and I thought I saw in it a sign of the dawn of a bright day, when more mutual esteem and confidence might prevail amongst us. That resolution was passed on the 28th October, the Board being fully aware that I was absent from home. What was my amazement, and I might add amusement, to learn from the public prints, on my return home on Saturday last, that within one week of the passing of that resolution, one half of the proposed committee—the two Roman Catholic members, met to make their investigation; that on the very day week of the passing of the resolution, and before it was possible for me to have heard of its existence, on Nov. 4th, the report of the gentlemen was sent in, and—this is the vital point—received and accepted by the Board. I do not remember to have ever heard or read of a more ingenious transaction. I must offer my congratulations to the Board on having discovered a method of gaining a character for just and generous dealings and at the same time avoiding any inconvenient consequences that might flow from it.—

I have been much disappointed to learn the interpretation put upon the order made by you this day week. I had hoped that Rachael Butler would have received her clothes at once, leaving it to the Local Government Board, if they thought proper, to order that they be taken away again, and that she would not have been left to shiver in this bitterly cold weather in much lighter clothing than she has been accustomed to. She has not, however, received them yet, contrary, I am sure, to the intention of your board, and has suffered not only from cold, but from the vexation and grief arising from the change, which cannot but be injurious to a woman who suffers from epilepsy. I beg of the board to try and realize what has been done. At the beginning of winter this poor afflicted woman has been stripped of her own comfortable clothing, and has got instead clothing which I can testify, from my own examination, is much slighter, and is, I believe, in her case, insufficient to keep her warm. As far as the board is concerned, I do not doubt this has been done unintentionally, but if persisted in, it will surely be universally condemned as most un-Christian cruelty. I see by the report in the paper that the pretext offered by the master for his act was some order given by the Local Government Board to the New Ross Union. I have not seen that order, but I have been told that it was made with reference to what the Local Government Board believed to be, whether rightly or wrongly, a great abuse of the power of taxation and of a public charity, which was perpetrated for a purely political object. A very different thing from an isolated indulgence, which really relieved the poor-rate, extended to a poor invalid woman. Is not this zealous obedience to the Local Government Board somewhat unusual? This day week the guardians showed, I think, a very decided determination to maintain their own views, in a matter on which they differed from that board, and if my memory does not deceive me, it is not long since they successfully defied the Local Government Board on the question of the school-master, but sometimes a conflict is carried on by a fictitious obedience as effectually as by open opposition in that conflict. I have no interest, and I express no opinion, about it, but I do say for the guardians to return to their snug, comfortable homes each board-day, leaving the weak body of poor Rachael Butler to bear the blows of the combatants, would be a baseness so inexpressibly mean that I would be sorry to suspect your board of it so long as I can possibly avoid it. I again most urgently ask your board to order that this very day her clothes be given to this poor woman. 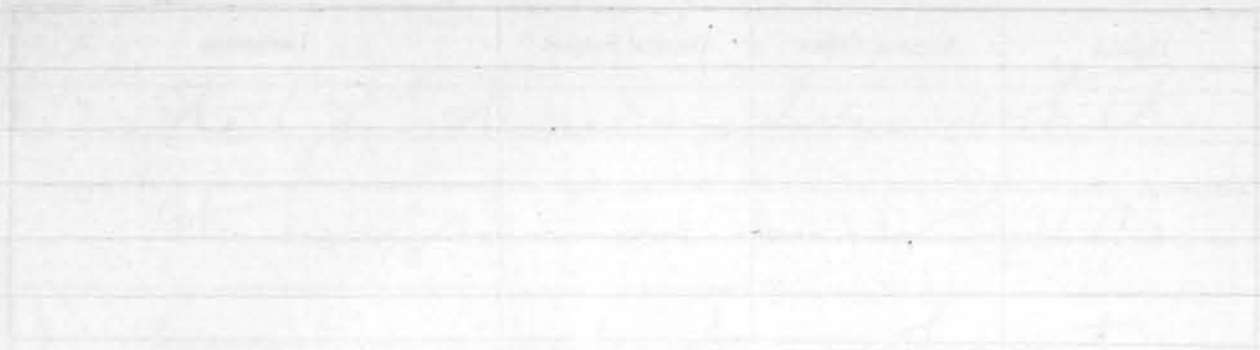

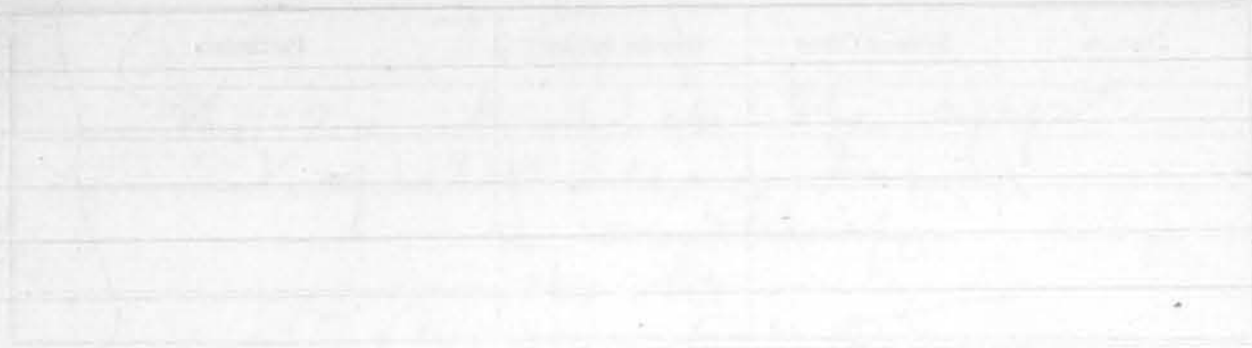
