

# In re Workhouse Schools

Mr. Macmillan, Inspector of National Schools, reported as follows:—

"Girls' School.—There were only 8 girls presented to-day in classes above that of infants. Of these, one, at least, is decidedly deficient in mental capacity. The answering of the others was, on the whole, fair. The infants were, for the most part, very young. Only half of them passed in reading the prescribed lessons. The failure of some, I have little doubt, was the result of their recent absence from school owing to illness—whooping-cough. I would suggest the boarding of one of the school-rooms at least; the tiled floor must be very cold."

"Boys' School.—Only 13 boys for examination, of which only four were in classes above first. Most are deficient in spelling. In all other branches the answering was pretty good and bore evidence of diligence and attention on the part of the teacher. The boys are orderly and well-conducted, and show by their deportment that Mr. M'Guire has taught them something of good manners. A new map of the world is required."

The board expressed great satisfaction with these reports, especially with that of the boys' school.

## MASTER'S REPORT.

The Master reported as follows:—

I attended at Newtownbarry Fever Hospital on Friday last for the purpose of taking stock of clothing in that establishment, which I found correct, and condemned the following, viz—Five blankets, two rugs, two towels, two men's coats, one vest, two shirts and five shifts. The hospital requires whitewashing and the windows and doors painted. It is essentially necessary to adopt some means to prevent the jackdaws from building their nests in the chimney. I would suggest that strong wire lattice-work be placed on the top of each chimney. I also visited Oulart Fever Hospital on Saturday for the purpose of taking stock of clothing, which I found correct, and condemned five sheets, eight blankets, and one towel. Require for the use of hospital—ten pairs of blankets, ten pairs of sheets, six chambers, two bed-pans, one foot-pan, one wash-tub. There are some slates off the roof of the hospital and straw-house; the door of the straw-house requires to be repaired; there are three pains of glass broken in the windows; the doors require painting, and the chimney swept. The same defence is required against the intrusion of the jackdaws as at Newtownbarry Fever Hospital. With regard to the oatmeal, I have again to request the Board to adopt the usual custom carried out for the last forty years, that is, to accept none but the best Tullow meal.

Free Franchise Act

REMUNERATION UNDER FRANCHISE ACT.  
The Clerk reported as follows:—  
I beg to ask the board for remuneration for my services under the Franchise Act for the year 1886. I may state for the information of the board that previously to the passing of the new Franchise Act, I received annually from this board £26 for these special services. The number of voters belonging to this Union was a little over 1,500 (1,536 in 1884). Now there are about 6,500, more than four times as many. Besides the increase of labour involved in duly allocating such a large number to their various polling districts. There has been added the duty of examining the immense number of notices to inhabitant occupiers, amounting to 7,116. As a guide to the board in this matter, I may state that the Boards of Wexford and New Ross have unanimously granted the sum of £80 each to their Clerks, which was sanctioned by the Local Government Board without any objection being made. I think I may fairly claim to be treated equally with these gentlemen, as the three Unions are almost equally circumstanced in this respect. I may also be excused for adding that so completely has the work (extensive as it is) been done under this Act in this Union, that in none of the County Courts has a single claim been made to the franchise, outside the lists prepared by me with the help of the officials of the Union.

MR. MAHER AND THE LABOURERS ACT.  
The Clerk read the following letter from Mr. Maher:  
Ballinkee, 15th March.  
SIR—In reply to your letter of the 11th inst., I beg to state for the information of the guardians that my reason for opposing the building of the labourers' cottages on my estate in Ballyhustard is entirely on behalf of the unfortunate ratepayers, for whom the guardian of that division appears to have no regard whatsoever. The rates on that division are already monstrously high—nearly double what they were a few years ago—and without, as far as I can see, any noticeable increase in pauperism, while provisions of all sorts were never as cheap as they have been for the last two years, and the guardians of other divisions have been able to reduce their rates considerably. The number of cottages already built and projected on Ballyhustard is far in excess of the requirements of the district, and I should say will about double the rates in future if there be not a check put on the building of them. Not a single one of the six cottages which I have now been able to put a stop to is required, and many of the ratepayers have complained to me bitterly of the awful and perfectly wanton burthen they will impose on the ratepayers for years to come, even supposing (which appears extremely doubtful) that all the houses will be constantly tenanted and the rents punctually paid. Under the circumstances, I feel it a duty both to myself and the other ratepayers to do all in my power to prevent this fearful squandering of our money without any corresponding benefit to the labouring class. It would be much more to the advantage of both farmers and labourers if some of the money were spent by the former in the employment of more labour on their farms, and some necessary repairs done (at a comparatively small cost) on the old houses. The new houses, too, appear to be on a most uncomfortable plan, and the buildings, as a rule, badly executed, so that they are likely to cost a considerable amount hereafter to keep them in habitable order. As regards the house on James Cummins' land, which is nearly completed, I am willing, if the guardians will drop the other five, to hand over to them the conveyance of the site (on being paid the compensation awarded for it) and allow the building to go on. I should feel obliged by an answer after the guardians have met this work.—Yours faithfully,

THE NEW SCHEME.  
The following letter was read from Mr. O'Dempsey, solicitor :-

I have perused and noted the various representation forms under the consideration of the Board for these schemes. I have also supplied the engineer with the necessary memoranda to enable him to mark the sites. I beg to call the attention of the Board to the following matters, viz. :-1. There are four instances in the electoral division of Ballyhuskard, one in the electoral division of Castleboro, and one in the electoral division of Edermine, making six in all, in which it is proposed to purchase existing cottages, and purchase and allot half acres of land to them under section XVI of the Act of 1885. It does not appear that any such proposed purchases and allotments are to be, by agreement, and a doubt seems to me to arise upon the construction of the section as to whether there is any power to make such purchase of cottages and lands for allotments, otherwise than by agreement, particularly having regard to the 12th section of the Act of 1886, which permits such purchases to be compulsory only where the Local Government Board are satisfied that all efforts to agree have failed. Before any expenses would be gone to in reference to these six proposals, I would suggest to the Board that it would be desirable to submit the doubt upon the matter to the Local Government Board, who, no doubt, have obtained advice on the subject. 2. I have observed that the representations are all founded, both on the grounds of (1) insufficient accommodation, and of (2) sanitary defects; but that they are not accompanied by any medical certificates in corroboration of the sanitary defects. Under these circumstances the Act of 1886, sec. VII., sub-section III, requires the sanitary authority to refer the representations to the medical officers for inspection of these districts, to report as to the correctness of the representation, and any such representation shall not be acted upon unless the sanitary authority is satisfied from the report of the medical officers, of the existence of the sanitary defects alleged. As the experience of the Board will, no doubt, justify the belief that the necessity for labourers' cottages is more frequently due to the sanitary condition of existing ones than to the absolute want of them, such as they are, the Board will see the necessity of directing the necessary steps required by the statute to enable them to maintain their schemes on the ground of sanitary defects, as well as on less applicable ground of the insufficient number of houses.
