The following important letter was read from Mr. O'Dempsey, solicitor to the Board:—

Mahe v. Guardians.
DEAR SIR—I have to report for the information of the Board, that pursuant to their instructions I duly entered an appearance to the writ of summons in this action on behalf of the Board. I also, on the 8th inst., tendered to Messrs. Fox & Corcoran, as solicitors for Mr. Maher, a certificate pursuant to the statute, defining the amount of money awarded to him—namely, £46 15s—accompanied by a notice, warning them that if they refused to receive the certificate or the money I would be obliged to deposit same in the bank in the name of the Accountant-General of the High Court. On the 11th inst., Messrs. Fox & Corcoran returned me the certificate, declining to accept same pending the action, and that as soon as I entered an appearance he would move for an injunction. In reply I served them with notice on Monday, the 13th inst., that I had already entered an appearance to the injunction action, and that the deposit of the money in the manner stated in my notice of the 8th inst., is a necessary step in the statutory completion of the guardians title consequent on the wilful and persistent refusal of Mr. Maher to accept the money or hand over the conveyances, and that unless within four days after the service hereof (a) either the threatened injunction is moved for, or (b) unless within the same period they gave an undertaking that they would

hand over the conveyances within a week after the dismissal of the injunction action, I should proceed to lodge the money in court, and make use of that notice on any question of costs. In reply to this challenge, on Thursday morning, the 16th inst., I received a letter from Messrs. Fox & Corcoran, stating that the affidavit to ground the injunction would be sworn on that day (Thursday), and that notice of the motion would be served on Friday. On Friday evening, being anxious to be prepared to meet the case at once, I wired to my town agent to telephone to Fox & Corcoran for the affidavit and notice, in order that I might prepare the necessary affidavit in reply, when I received a telegram in reply stating that no papers had been served. Accordingly on Saturday morning, the time allowed by my notice having expired, I wrote to Messrs. Fox & Corcoran stating, as they had not complied with either alternative of my notice of the Monday previous, notwithstanding the assurance contained in their letter of Thursday morning, that I had no alternative but to deposit the money in court. Accordingly I have duly deposited the money in the Bank of Ireland, and I beg to transmit to the Board the final document, the execution of which, by them is necessary to complete their title in the absence of Mr. Maher's consent—namely, a Deed Roll under the statute describing the lands and declaring the circumstances. Please have same executed under the Seal of the Board and return same.

Replies to Queries*

Mr. Maurice Murphy, C.W., wrote as follows:—

In reply to the questions asked by Mr. Cummins on this day week, I beg to reply as follows:—House No. 200, in Ballyhuskard is completed, and the contractor has been paid three instalments, but £10 is held over for fencing. I certified for the 3rd instalment, June 16th, 1887. House 203, three instalments, the last April 21st, '87. House 204, three instalments, the last April 14th, '87. House 216, two instalments, the last March 10th, '87. House 218, two instalments, the second May 18th, '87. In connection with house No. 209 I have examined it on yesterday, the second time, and I found the footings to average from 16 to 18 inches, that is from 2 to 4 inches more than is required by the specification. I have also to remark for the information of the Board that in some cases I have found the seat of the privies altogether removed, and the walls of ashpits broken down for the purpose of hanging gates. In another instance I have found some of the slates stripped from the porch of one cottage, which I believe to be maliciously done.

Gentlemen,

In reply to the letter of the 28th June last from Mr. James Cummins to your Board, charging me with making false reports for the purpose of advancing money to favourite Contractors, and of giving evasive reports in connection with House 209, I have to state Mr. Cummins was well aware that the Cottages 203 and 204 were completed with the exception of the floor of one of them, which was not laid.

He was also aware that your late Chairman, Mr. Flynn, visited those Houses and stated to your Board that they were a credit to the Contractor.

Your Board may not be apprised that John Sinnott, the Contractor, entered into a Bond for £510 with two solvent securities for the erection of seven Cottages, and so, let me ask your Board was it anything unfair of me (knowing the conditions above stated, and that the said Contractor had three other Houses almost finished) in giving a Certificate for the first two? In my opinion, it would have been more unfair, and certainly more disobliging, to have retained it under the circumstances, because, for the sake of two or three hours' work, the man might have been stopped at his business for want of money.

Mr. Cummins says "such a practice would not be tolerated in any other Union"; but, I can tell him, correct, the Limerick Union made advances to Contractors, who gave good securities, before

the work commenced at all.

As to House 216, if Mr. Cummins would substitute 217, it would be correct. I never certified for Cottage 216 - it must have been a printer's error.

Now, I challenge Mr. Cummins to prove that my report about House 209 was evasive, which, on the contrary, was no report at all. I still assert that my report regarding the footing is correct, because it is from 14 to 18 inches. I have since inspected 210 and 212, and I have found the footings of those Houses averaging from 16 to 21 inches. If Mr. Cummins had any suspicion that the footings of those Houses were not correct, why did he keep the stone in his sleeve until now, when the Cottages are almost completed? It is quite evident that Mr. Cummins knows but little about footings for Houses, from his questions to me - asking me to give the depths of the trenches for footings, which any man of common sense knows to be an impossibility. Where a House is being built on an incline - as a great many of these are - can any two feet of the trench be the one depth? The Board may know that no general rule can be adopted in connection with foundations.

My object was always, after removing the surface soil, if there was a pure and solid bottom, to raise the footings; for, if the floor be not higher than the surface soil, it never can be dry, especially if the land be naturally moist. If the floor be on a level with the outside surface, as Mr. Cummins seems to think it should, what is to keep the water from running in through the perforated tiles under the boarded floor?

I have known, in two instances, where the footing had to be raised at the back $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet over the surface

otherwise, the floor should be a corresponding depth under in front.

Now, gentlemen, as this thing has been going on long enough, and as the public are beginning to think that Mr. Cummins is prompted by other motives than the Rate-payers interest in assailing me from week to week, for the last year and a half, with flimsy charges and insinuations, as to favorite Contractors, all which I cannot understand, I have to say, if he do not write more plainly, that I have treated all the Contractors as I found them - honestly and fairly, when inclined to do their best.

However, I do not claim to be infallible, as other mortal men; for, some small things may have escaped my notice, even when I thought the job was finished, which is not to be wondered at, when one occupies one of those Cottages, of whom Mr. Cummins complained, admitted before your Board that he was eight or nine months residing in his house before he detected the defects - I may say that any faults or omissions that I have found, or which have been pointed out to me, the Contractor has made right, or will do so in every case, but two exceptions which I am now getting done myself.

When I was appointed, I appealed to every Guardian at the Board to render me all the assistance in their power to carry out the work, and I am glad and grateful to say that they have all done so with one exception, and that was Mr. Cummins.

He has always brought his complaints before the Board, while others pointed out what was defective to myself in person. I did not pretend, at first, to have a thorough

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knowledge of the work, but I think I have gained
some experience during the last two years.

Now, Mr. Chairman, I respectfully request you
to appoint a Committee of three or four persons
not deeply interested in Ballinuskard Ecc. Division
to inspect the Cottages in question, and make a
report. I will bow to their decision, which I
believe will be just and honorable; but, I sh
say I object to Mr. Cummins having anything
to do in appointing the persons. It would
take but about two hours after the sitting of
the Board. I trust you will comply with
my request; for, I can assure you I am
not lying on a bed of roses - a remark
that was made by a member of your
Board on a recent occasion, and which
I have felt to be strictly applicable to
my present situation.
