## CLONROCHE DISPENSARY.

The ordinary meeting was held on February 6th. Present—Messrs. T. Dunne (in the chair), E. Robinson, P. Doyle, R. Aspell, M. Codd, H. H. O'Neill, R. Stafford, P. Sinnott, Q. Doyle. The minutes of the last meeting were read, and the Medical Officer's books examined. The committee are of opinion that the relief register should be more accurately and regularly filled up, and the hours of attendance at the Dispensary, as set forth in the report book, are not satisfactory, and they consider that the Medical Officer should attend more punctually during the appointed hours. The Medical Officer laid before the committee his explanation in reference to certain allegations preferred against him at last meeting. His explanations for them are as follows:—

GENTLEMEN—There are a series of four charges of which you request a written explanation. I will take them in the order of their date. The first is relative to my absence from the dispensary on the 23rd December, 1887. Upon that day I received word from the Coroner, through a policeman, to attend at 11 o'clock an inquest at Galbally, which is within my district. I was detained at the inquest till after 1 o'clock, and the place six miles distant, it was not possible for me to attend. The second is neglect of D Sinnott, who died of erysipelas of head. I received a ticket from him on the evening of the 23rd, and attended between ten and eleven o'clock on the 24th. He seemed to be improving, and I gave my directions as to his treatment. I informed the man's wife I would be away from home for a day or two, that I would see him again on the 26th, and that if he got worse to send word, and the doctor who was doing my duty would visit him during the interval. No word was sent till the morning of the 26th, when my substitute immediately went, but found the man dead. I affirm that there was no neglect. The third charge that I was absent from the dispensary on the 26th December, I wish to state that I was absent upon leave given by the committee, and that I supplied my own substitute, who attended and did the duty. The fourth charge, relative to Mary Kehoe, Killegney, who is an old woman about 80 years of age, and to attend whom I got a ticket, and attended the same day, and twice afterwards. I found her suffering from chronic bronchitis and anæmia decay. I prescribed for her, and she is still alive, and I believe as well as usual. Hoping you will find above explanation sufficient.

P.S.—The committee also require to know the reason of my being half an hour late at the dispensary on January 2nd. I was there a little before 12 o'clock, and it was by remaining a short time on the road speaking to one of the

committee whom I accidentally met on the road that I lost the half hour on that day. The committee accepted the explanations, but considered the reason of his being late at the dispensary on January 2nd as frivolous.

An Invoice of Medicines forwarded by the Contractor for the

Dispensary District, in pursuance of an Order of the Board in their Minutes of having been received from him, the Clerk laid the Invoice before the Board, and was directed to forward the same (or reported that he had forwarded the same, as the case may be) to the Medical Officer of the District, retaining a copy of the Invoice for the use of the Guardians.

RE WILKINSON V. SINNOTT.

The following letter was read from Mr. O'Dempsey, Solicitor to the Board:—  
I beg to report for the information of the board that after several adjournments of the motion the cause shown by me on behalf of the guardians against the parish order obtained by the plaintiff in this action was allowed and the order discharged on the ground that the guardians are not at present indebted to Sinnott, the defendant, in any sum whatever, the house not being finished pursuant to his contract. The court indicated an opinion that the letters sent by the board to Mr. Greene operated to an effectual assignment to him of the supposed debt. The order was discharged without costs to any party, the majority of the court expressing an opinion that the direction for payment made by the board on the 12th inst. and subsequently cancelled on the following board after service of the parish order misled the plaintiff into the belief that there was a debt that could be attacked and that having thus brought about the proceedings themselves, they should abide their own costs. It should be mentioned that Mr Justice Murphy did not concur with the latter view, and stated that he could not see what the guardians had done to disentitle them to their costs. The order, of course, was made in accordance with the opinion of the majority.—Yours,
