Clerk's Office, March 31st, 1888.
To the Secretary, Local Government Board.
SIR—I beg to be allowed to submit to the Local Government Board a few remarks in reference to the enclosure (with to-day's copy of minutes, part 1) of the hours of my attendance at the Clerk's Office in the Workhouse. This, by no means, represents the time devoted by me to Union work. As I reside on the opposite side of the town from the Workhouse, I took any incidental "external" business relating to the union—such as "Post-office," "banking," "consultations" with the solicitor to the board, seeing contractors, &c., &c., on my way thither—I made no special effort to be at the office at any precise hour, not thinking it necessary. Mr. Brennan attended there at 10 o'clock every day (till lately). My usual course was to get there about 12. We then left, both of us, at 3 to dinner; he returning about 4, and I about half-past 4 or 5; leaving the office at half-past 6 or 7. I found this plan of double visits to the office to suit much better than a uniform attendance of, say, from 10 to 3. When I took office first I tried that plan, but found that neither collectors, doctors, or others would attend early in the day. There was another reason also for the change. I got the midday delivery of letters and had time to reply same day, which I have always made "a point" of doing when feasible. Capt. Hamilton, Ex-Local Government Board Inspector, on one occasion asked me why I did not attend "at regular bank hours," and when I explained as above to him, I heard no more about it from him. But, "behind" all this, I have been in the habit of working at the "apportionments" involved in the

Union's accounts, at my own house at night, where I am free from the almost ceaseless interruptions occurring at the office. This, of itself, involves an enormous amount of time "unrecorded" to my credit. I have, also, very much, done the correspondence at my own house, and other "portable" things requiring head work and close attention. It would be manifestly unfair, therefore, to assume that the list of hours enclosed represented the amount of time I give to the work. It is very annoying to me to have in self-defence to intrude anything like personal surroundings into business matters, but I may be excused mentioning that I have no public occupations or employment of any kind to interfere with due attention to union work. I have no connection with any firm or house in the locality; I have no farm to divide my anxieties and thoughts. I doubt, if there be in Ireland another union where the Clerk's office was so accessible to the guardians and the public for the last twelve years, as this up to the present; there has never been a complaint from either guardians or ratepayer of inattention or neglect. I have been, since Christmas last, I may say, deprived of the assistance of a clerk, and I am unable to bear much longer the severe strain of the work necessary to be done to keep things going here, and yet this is the time selected to make this side attack on me. It has disappointed some people, I fancy, very much that I have come out "unsoiled" through the recent inquiry here. The "enclosed" is meant, I presume, to convey the inference that if I were regularly, from 10 to 3, in the office every day, Brennan could not have swindled as he did, whereas the evidence at the inquiry showed that it was on Sunday and after 3 o'clock (after Bank hours) he had carried out his plans, principally, as if he would arrange to scheme within certain fixed hours, I being there, surely, as a matter of course! I beg to add that I have not been out of Ennisceorthy one single day for the last twelve months, except when on leave in September, '87. I am always to be seen at my own house when not at the office, and any gaps in the regular attendance here are the result of sickness which in my case does not represent even idleness, as I frequently work away, even when unable to travel over to office, through "a cold-caster," at union work. SIR—I return herewith my letter of March 31st, as directed. I am now under the necessity of appealing most respectfully to the Local Government Board for its protection against a most glaring act of injustice which it is proposed to carry out against me. (Vide, copy of minutes, part of April 19th.) Twice Mr. Brennan, ex-assistant clerk, was suspended by your board. I have several times requested the Board here to take steps to fill up the vacancy. They deferred doing so, and on April 19th passed as follows:—"That our clerk in future discharge his duties without requiring the appointment of an assistant clerk by the Board of Guardians." That is they decline to fill an office now vacant and created at their own express desire by your board in Nov. 1881. Moreover, when obtaining said appointment they reduced my salary as clerk of union from £120 per annum to £70—applying the £50 taken from me to the payment of Mr. Brennan, to which £50 the board subsequently added £22, making his salary £72 per annum as assistant Clerk. This £72 it is now coolly proposed to appropriate from its allocated purpose, with the exception of £10 per year to be added to my present salary of £70, thus depriving me of £40 of my original income. I have told the board I cannot get on in such a large union as this without assistance and good assistance. The late Clerk Mr. Kennedy, had £130 a year as Clerk of Union at a time when the work was "child's play" to the present, and had clever assistants (of course at his own expense). I must pay an assistant £1 a week at least (if I can get a good one for that), so that by the proposal now made I would have the munificent sum of £28 per annum as Clerk of Union. I therefore respectfully ask your board to use the powers vested in them, and to compel the Board of Guardians either to fill up the vacant post by the election of a competent person or to revert to the *status quo ante*—of my original salary £120 per annum and my own choice of an assistant.—I beg to remain, sir, your obedient servant,

DANIEL KEOHLER, Clerk of Union.

P.S.—Permit me to add that I have been rather hardly dealt with in the matter of salary emoluments. When Brennan was appointed assistant clerk in Nov., '81, the Local Government Board took away £34 per annum from my salary as executive sanitary officer, reducing it to £22 per annum. Then, in Feb., 1883, my salary as clerk to local authority under Cattle Diseases Act was reduced from £20 per year to £10. Last year I got £60 under the Franchise Act, but this year only £30, and out of both these sums I paid £10 for extra assistance. The clerks of similar unions to this have got much more—in Wexford £30, Waterford £50, New Ross £70. This present proposal practically does little more than leave the "extras" and "fees" of the position to pay for the clerkship. I enclose a report of Thursday's meeting of the Board, which may be taken as fairly accurate.
