THE LATE DEFALCATIONS.  
The following important letter was read from the  
Solicitor to the Board:—

Ennisecorby, 18th May, 1888.

Re-Thomas Murphy and Rates.

DEAR SIR—Pursuant to the reference to me of the letter of the Local Government Board, bearing date the 21st day of March last, I have taken steps to ascertain the exact state of Murphy's collection, both with a view that the reassessment of the amount due and collectable, and also to ascertain the precise figure which his sureties will have to be answerable for. With that view I addressed a circular to all parties whom he had returned in his collecting books as being indebted to the guardians for rate and arrears struck on the 23rd Dec., 1886, and I have set out in the annexed schedule the result of my investigations in that respect, the result of my investigations being that I have been obliged to give credits to various parties who appeared in the collecting books as being indebted to the extent of £19 16s., the details of which will be found set out in the schedule. The Board will remember that the amount originally to be collected by Murphy was £1,191 9s. 4d., of which he has lodged with the treasurer £888 9s. 8d., leaving £302 19s. 8d. to be accounted for. Deduct 6s. 3d. for abatements, which will leave £296 13s. 4d. From this deduct £95 13s. 10d., the amount found by me as remaining due and collectable, and to be carried over to the next rate, and there will remain a sum of £200 19s. 6d. to be made good by the sureties. I have also had referred to me a proposal signed by the sureties and the collector, asking for time for payment of the amount of their liabilities by instalments extending over a period of 12 months from the present—viz., half their liabilities on the 10th Oct. next, the second instalment in 3 months after that, and the balance in the following 3 months. They offer no additional security, and in my opinion the guardians, as a public body, would not be justified in giving time merely upon the present security, which they already hold, without the sanction of the Local Government Board. I return herewith their proposal. It will be time enough to consider the allowance of the grant of collection fees when the parties are otherwise in a position to make good the defalcation.—Yours, &c.,


