I have to report that on Friday 1st instant, a savage assault was made by an Inmate named Dominick Connors, on another Inmate named John Scott, with a sweeping brush, the blows of which fractured the skull.

I immediately went for the Police, who took Connors into Custody. Scott died from the Effects of the injuries he received on Monday the 4th inst.

An inquest was held by Mr Coroner Murphy and a respectable Jury. The finding being manslaughter against Connors.

"We find that the said John Scott came by his death at the Workhouse of the Kinsborough Union on the 4th of February, 1899, from injuries to his skull, inflicted unlawfully and feloniously by one Dominick Connors on the 1st day of February, 1899, in the Workhouse, and we wish to add that we consider the present arrangements in the Idiot Ward most defective, and suggest that the Guardians would take such steps as would prevent a similar occurrence as that in the present case."

Sir—I beg to enclose copy of verdict in this case, and also copy of rider added thereto by the jury, who also requested me to ask you to place the verdict and rider on the minute of your proceedings at your next meeting, with the view that the Local Government Board would instruct their Inspector to have such arrangements made as would prevent another such case as that of the said John Scott; and the jury also wish me to state that they consider there has been great dereliction of duty either on the part of the Local Government Inspector or the Guardians, particularly as the violent conduct and insubordination of the said Dominick Connors have been so frequently reported to the Guardians.—I am, Sir, your obedient servant,
