The Minutes of last Meeting were read and signed.

The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 2631 to No. 2753 both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 9836 to No. 9840 both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report was read to the following effect:— *Inver remuneration under Labourers acts*

CLERK'S REPORT.

The Clerk reported—"In accordance with my promise to the Board I lodged, on the 26th inst., with the treasurer of the union the sum of £19 4s 3d, being the total amount of the deficiency in the rents of labourers' houses not handed over to me by Brennan (late assistant clerk) although received by him from the collectors of rent. I also lodged, last week, the sum of £120 received from the Board of Works, being final instalment due the union of loans advanced, amounting to £2820, to carry out the schemes of 1883 and 1884 for the erection of labourers' houses. As this completes all direct transactions connected with the carrying out of these schemes, and before fresh ones are entered on, I beg leave to call the attention of the board to the fact that for the additional labours and responsibility thrown on me by the adoption of the Labourers Acts, in October 1883, now nearly six years ago, I have received no remuneration whatever. The duties have been most arduous, irksome, and annoying—so much so that I would much prefer to have done all the ordinary legitimate business of the union. If the board wish I shall be ready to lay before it on whatever day it decides to take this matter into consideration, particulars as to the enormous amount of exceptional and special work thrown on me. Meantime, I may say that for the legal work involved the board has paid its solicitor the sum of £2662 17s. 1d. and I think I may fairly claim to be equally well treated at its hands. It is hard to give even a remote idea of the almost numberless items, and ~~the~~ calculations for the last five and a half years, but I may be permitted to mention that the auditor of the Local Government Board, Mr. Finlay expressed his pleasure at the way these accounts, involved and intricate as they are, were presented to him at his audits. I trust the board will show its appreciation also of my prospective confidence in its fair treatment of me, when the proper time would have come to make my claim upon it, as I have worked on for nearly six years 'in faith' that when the 'set time' did come, as it now has, to do so, I would receive a fitting and substantial reward for my lengthened services in this special direction."

- (11) The inmates seem to be well cared for. Their persons are clean, their clothing clean & good.
- (12) The interior of the House is remarkably clean and neat, leaving nothing to be desired - The House we believe to be managed well.

The door going into the women's division is old, and not worth repairing, a new one should be made.

A new Cistern should be got for pump house. One large enough to hold one days supply of water. The night lodgers could be made to pump the water.

The master says he has some difficulty in getting men to pump in the summer time.


