

Mr. Gregory Murphy said he wished to propose a resolution before the board separated respecting the coercion trials which had just closed yesterday in Gorey. He proposed, and Mr. Moses Kearns seconded, the following resolutions, which were passed unanimously:—

"That we hereby sympathise with the latest victims of coercion, Messrs. Kavanagh, Doyle, Byrne, and Greene, all of Coolgreany; and Messrs. Mordaunt Monamolin; and Mellon, Monaseed, who were yesterday, at Gorey, sentenced by Balfour's Removables to long terms of imprisonment for alleged conspiracy to induce persons not to purchase cattle, &c., from landgrabbers and oppressive rackrenting exterminators at the different fairs." "That we pity the recent tactics of Dr. Falconer, who in the past has got many a brief (through our local solicitors) out of the people of this county, who appeared not only to prosecute, but to endeavour to make little, if he could, by uncalled for jibes and insults, of the several victims of landlord oppression and sterling self-sacrificing Irishmen, the above-named, at the latest coercion trials at Gorey."
