he found some sheep that were suffering from scab,
and consequently under restrictions and could not be
touched. Before three months were over the animals
had died. Since then he (Mr Somers) had visited
the farm and found no stock on it. Hearing since
the eviction of Mrs Kehoe that there were sheep
grazing on it he went there, but found they had
been driven away before his arrival. If the board
did not wish to proceed against Mr Doyle for the re-
covery of the rate he (Mr Somers) would be obliged
to wait until the farm was occupied to try and
the amount of the rate due.

CLERK'S REPORT.

"Before the dissolution of the present board, I beg to present to it for acceptance the claims of the Poor-rate Collectors of the Union and myself for remuneration in respect of services rendered in accordance with the provisions of the 'Representation of the People Act, 1884.' The Poor-rate Collectors claim at the rate of 2d. for each paper delivered to and taken up from the 'Inhabitant Occupiers' of the Union as follows:—D. McDonald, £11 14s 6d; Thomas Nolan, £13 13s 4d; P. Fortune, £7 2s 6d; J. Walsh, £7 1s 2d; P. Lambert, £7 18s 4d; E. Somers, £7 7s 2d; M. Doyle, £4 15s 4d. Total, £59 12s 4d. As for myself, I beg to claim from the board the same amount as given by the boards of Wexford and New Ross Unions to their Clerks, viz, £80 each for similar services. It is not fair or just to me to offer me, as has been done for the last three years, little more than half the amount each of these gentlemen receives—namely, only £50. If the work had been done partially or carelessly by me there might be some excuse for this inequality; but when I can state that even with the addition under 'the new Franchise Act,' of such a large number of Parliamentary voters, not one single claim has been made or complaint advanced of either negligence to register or of unjust deprivation of the privilege, it will be seen how completely the spirit of the Act has been carried out in this Union by me. Why, then, am I treated so unfairly in this matter? I hope this year the board will remedy the injustice I have been subjected to heretofore, by placing me on an equality with the Clerks of the neighbouring Unions in the County specified. 


