



Gentlemen, The immediate accommodation of the poor applying for admission into the Goucester Union Workhouse occupies the serious consideration of the Guardians.

The conversion of one half of the Dining Room into a sleeping apartment appears to me to be much less objectionable than tenanted a separate house, but this occupation of the Dining Hall even if it did meet with your approval would only accommodate the paupers already admitted, with as much room as is desirable. The prevalence of Fever and a fatal form of Dysentery in the neighbourhood and actually in the House itself, make it peculiarly hazardous to crowd the sleeping apartments.

Judging from what I see around me, I am of opinion that an enlargement of the House is imperatively called for, and this not to meet a casual demand, but to meet the permanent wants of the District. Numbers of people have become utter bankrupts & with no prospect of being able again to maintain themselves, this must necessarily throw an immense pressure on the Poor House.

It will be impossible for me to sanction the admissions of paupers much longer, and I now wish explicitly to state that it is my firm conviction that the necessary steps for the salutary enlargement of the House admit of no delay and shall be at once proceeded with.

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Recently passed all advances to Poor Law Unions are required to be made by the Relief Commissioners appointed under the Act - The Poor Law Commissioners will not interfere, and since the passing of the above Act, The Guardians have a power themselves to give a Legal Security on the Rates of the Union, and if the Bank as the Treasurer made the advance required it would have no Legal remedy by which to recover the debt - What I have stated applies equally to the application to Guardian, in anticipation of the incoming rates The proper course for the Guardians to take is to apply at once to the Relief Commissioners Dublin Castle

  - 2<sup>nd</sup> The Nursery is kept in a filthy state, the Board seem as if they had never been scoured
  - 3<sup>rd</sup> The Bed Picks are nearly all out of repair and require mending, and some of them are <sup>very</sup> much soiled
  - 4<sup>th</sup> Most of the Beds Contained bundles of Old Clothes and other matters belonging to the paupers, and almost every pauper had more or less of their own Clothing on, The clothes of a Pauper on admission should be cleaned and laid up until the Pauper leaves leaving the Workhouse.

If the Children were but few the want might be supplied by one or two pauper inmates, but with such a number this mode has worked badly and left the Children with out moral training or religious knowledge, and being thus brought up, they will soon in a short time, while in the world, regular inmates of it, and when they leave it bad members of Society.
