any decree except conditionally until he should have the opinion of a Crown Lawyer. I put in Duty bound to observe that Mr Denerry promised me every assistance in his power to facilitate the collection of the rates, and that his refusal of granting decrees on the present occasion emanated purely from his not being justified to do so according to law.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:

No 44.605 ^{of} 1st January 1848. Authorizing and empowering the Guardians for two Months from the date of this order to administer Relief out of the Workhouse in Food to Destitute Persons ~~as~~ ^{not} ~~employed~~ being Widows with one Child dependant on them respectively or being Children whose Parents are both dead.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, /or, Orders made on them respectively, as follows:—

Letter from the Commissioners No 7 ^{M/} 48. 3rd January 1848. Calling the attention of the Clerk to their letter of the 22nd ultimo requiring to be furnished with a Return of Orphans, Deserter Children and Young Persons in the Young Union. The Commissioners stateplain that the Statement was required by Government, and is now delayed by the non-receipt of the return, and they request it will be transmitted without further delay.

Letter from the Commissioners No 44-479 ^{of} 4th January 1848 in reply to the Clerks letter of the 29th ultimo relating to the sums which Mr Sherwood the late Clerk of the Young Union had applied to his own use instead of the uses for which they were intended, stating that the Contractors to whom payments have not been made in consequence of the funds committed by the late Clerk are still entitled to the amount of their accounts, and cannot be made to suffer by the acts of the Clerk. It appears to the Commissioners that the Guardians Should in the first instance satisfy themselves that the parties now making Claims on them have not been already paid and that they should when so satisfied pay the amounts due. The Commissioners press upon the Conscienc of the Guardians the propriety of taking the most active steps with a view to the punishment of the late Clerk, and for the recovery from himself or his Sureties of the sums which he has Misappropriated.

Letter from the Commissioners No 44.622 ^{of} 4th January 1848 expressing their sanction of the Proposals of the Board of Guardians to accept the house offered to be lent them by Mr Doyne for a Slipping

apartment for the Use of the Workhouse Inmates, and to rent Mr Baylis Stable for the purpose of providing additional Workhouse accommodation and expressing the Commissioners approval of the proposal to fit up the Workhouse stable for a sleeping apartment.

Letter from the Commissioners No 839/48. 7th January 1848. Stating that a copy of a report which they had received from their architect of his inspection of the Buildings in the course of erection at the Workhouse Infirmary was forwarded therewith.

Letter from Geo: Willmssen Esq to the Commissioners No 839/48. 5th January 1848. Reporting that he had last week Inspected the New Building standing on east side of the Infirmary at the Goye Union Workhouse, and Stating that the Buildings are now nearly finished, and that the Works generally appear to be executed in a satisfactory Manner,

Letter from the Commissioners No 586/48. 7th January 1848. With reference to the Clerk's communication of the 23rd November last, forwarding therewith for the information of the Board of Guardians of the Goye Union a copy of an opinion of the Law Adviser of His Excellency ~~of the~~ the points submitted by Mr Derryggy J.P.

Opinion of Henry Baldwin Esq No 586/48. 3rd January 1848
on the points submitted by Mr Derryggy J.P. - The Clerk was directed to send a copy to Mr Derryggy of this opinion.

Letter from the Commissioners No 44-622 147. 7th January 1848

With reference to the resolution contained in the Minutes of the Proceeding of the Board of Guardians of the Goye Union ^{on the 24th ultmo} directing the Clerk to advertise for 1st Cwt Flax and 1st Cwt Wool, the Commissioners request they may be informed whether permission has been obtained from the Company in which the Workhouse is insured from fire, to Store and Manufacture Flax and Wool in the Workhouse. The Clerk got directions to write to the Insurance Company asking their permission.

Provisional Admissions into the Workhouse, and applications for admissions were considered and decided on, as set forth in the Application and Report Book.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year,

a Tender from John M. Redemann proposing to Supply the Workhouse with ^{White} Bread for one Man to begin the 1st of January at £ 6/- per loaf was accepted.

a Tender from John Redemann for Supplying the Workhouse for one Month with Indian Meal from the 1st of January at £ 11/- per cwt, and one from Mr Martin for Supplying it for the same time at £ 10/-19 were Considered, and after some discussion on the quality of each, it was Proposed by Mr Foley and Seconded by Mr Bevin that Mr Redemann's tender be Accepted - Carried,

A Letter from Mr Gossage Ballant Rat Revisor tendering his resignation was read by the Board, a copy was desired to be sent to the Commissioners, and the Clerk is directed to State to Mr Ballant that the Board has no power to accept of his resignation but it will be laid before the Commissioners.

Proposed by Mr Dayne that the Collectors of Poor Rate Committee be authorized to take up the Books from the Rat Revisor and to prepare them - Carried

Resolved that the Price of Interning a pauper be reduced from $\frac{3}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ and that able bodied Paupers be sent from the house to make the grans in future.

The Question of Collectors of Poor Rate is again Postponed till this day next when it will be finally disposed of.

Stephen Murphy a resident in the Shillelagh Union presented himself before the Board as an applicant for relief. he stated that one of the Relieving Officers of the Shillelagh Union had refused to relieve him on the grounds of his not being a resident long enough.

The Board decided that he should be admitted into this Workhouse for the night, and dismissed in the Morning with a letter from the Clerk to the Shillelagh Board Stating that they are obliged to relieve him, and directing their attention to the Commissioners letter No 634 M/47 29th December 1847 on this subject.

an application from Timothy Kinsella stating that the value
of his Premises was diminished by the taking down of two houses,
and requesting they should be revalued, was referred to Mr. Collier

Leaders for Wool were desired to stand over

that in case of their neglecting to do so, or neglecting to

that the Clerk be authorized to employ an Assistant at
£1 per week, by the week.

The Clerk is directed to forward the following query to the

the Commissioners authorize the relieving officer to give provisional
relief to this woman?
