Masters Report, — Mr Lord Gutteridge, in compliance with your directions to give a written explanation to the report of Dr Bowie (Coroner & Inspector) viz:— Why each Ward of the Infirmary had large quantities of Bed Clothes (Other than those in actual use or on beds which were not occupied) piled on shelves also several articles of house clothing concealed between the beds & trunks and stretchers" — In reply I beg to say those shelves were put up in each Ward in the Infirmary by the direction of Mr Joseph Boncke ^{late} (Coroner & Inspector) for the purpose of holding the extra clothes and they were never found fault with by any person until Dr Bowie did and I had them removed the next day. The clothes between the beds and stretchers ^{(not being taken into Dr Bowie's) I believe,} were the immigrants clothes of Catherine Dore (who is now over the room) and family who have since gone to America — There is no fixed Sea dietary not had there been since the house was opened — The tea was ordered by the late Medical Officer and the present one, as extras and the quantity is 1oz of Tea and 1/4 lb of Sugar weekly which is weighed and given to each patient which they use in a ^{any matter to their own taste} they never heard of a single complaint.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:

Master Report contd — The tea supplied by the Contractor was bad which he exchanged "stating he had just opened and found it not good"

The orphan school boy Matthew Steagh, who was ordered clothes on the 30 Oct, by the Rev. Charles (Ward) refused to go in consequence of the tailor requiring him to serve 4 years which was not mentioned when he applied for him. Therefore I refused to give him clothes.

I made this class read in the fourth Book page 1st & 2nd

The reading was fair and the spelling very satisfactory, There are only 3 of 7 in this class who have been in, time in it, the rest are only in the class about one month

4th class began to write on paper from the ^{1st} week of 6 months back, I read this class some of the book and thought the spelling fair and generally correct, The writing on paper shows a manifest improvement and is ^{kept very correct & regular} done very clean, I can find no fault in the manner in which this class is attended to I heard them read and was well satisfied with the manner in which it was done,

2nd & 3rd classes are from 3 to 7 years of age and are learning spelling and primer and into slates,

The matter explained the reason of the parties being in the kitchen was that it being near dinner time (4 o'clock) they were in waiting to carry out the food as soon as the Protestant Chaplain was done praying. They were all elderly persons but the girl Cannon, Letherland is the Clerk's assist and came into the kitchen on the matter's business.

The Board on enquiring do not consider there was anything improper between the parties complained of and they desired the Master for the future not to have any girls discharging duties in the kitchen excepting widows and aged persons.
