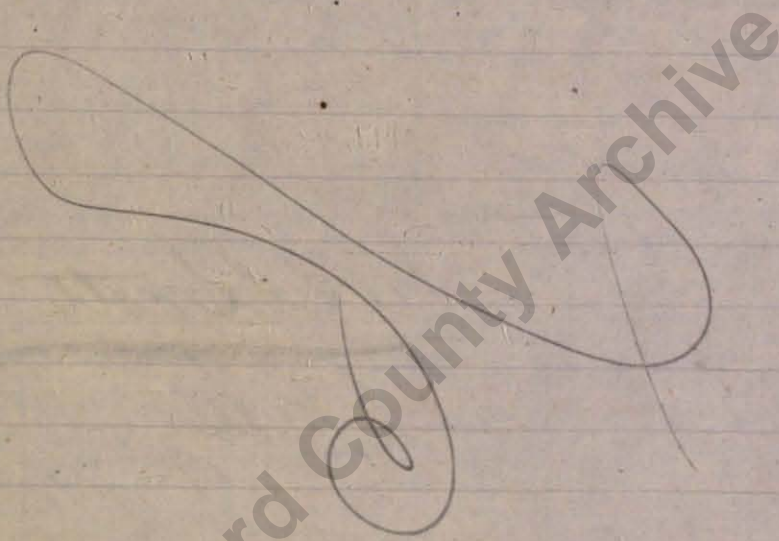

Strens 25 Feby 1861 — Sir, In reply to your letter of the 23rd Inst saying that I had refused to attend a poor Man named Patrick Molloy of Ballyquack who was very ill the Receiver a Ticket for that purpose from the Relieving Officer. I beg to say for the information of the Board of Guardians, that the Ticket of the Rel. Off. was not for attendance but ^{to} visit Molloy for the purpose of certifying whether or not he was able to be removed with safety ^{to} his life to the Workhouse, as on application to the Relieving Officer ^{the} fully established, I am Sir your obedient Servant,
 Wm Taylor, Temporary Medical

P.S. I consider the foregoing a satisfactory refutation of the charge of neglect but on re-perusing your letter I observe you require a "full explanation" of the circumstances for the ^{info} ~~information~~ of the Board of Guardians — they will find on reading this my postscript the full explanation given. On the 30th Ultimo, I received a letter by post from Mr Green Relieving Officer, enclosing a Ticket and requesting me to visit Patrick Molloy of Ballyquack but neither requiring me to attend him nor to say was he fit for the Workhouse — but could he be removed with safety to his life; this I did on the 31st Ultimo, I wrote to the Relieving Officer on my return home that I found him very ill but the possibility of removing him to the Workhouse existed yet as the Weather was so severe probably a fortnight's out-door relief would be a more humane course to adopt with him & then he could be removed. This observation I made in consequence of the Weather being so peculiarly severe, that day it rained on me from the time I left home till I returned. I asked Molloy's wife why in a long illness like her husband's she had not sought Medical advice for him & that ^{early} ~~only~~ when it could be made profitable to him, when she said she got medicines from some person near her with which she was satisfied & that there existed a disposition of Consumption in his family & that she then considered his case hopeless. On that day week the 7th Inst the Relieving Officer met me at Cranford & asked me who would be in

Charge of the Dispensary on that day week, I replied I could not
tell, but if I was, I would visit Molloy & report to him his then
state, and if not, I would get the Doctor in charge to visit and
write to him, & so save him the trouble of looking and farther after
him, I asked him then why a Ticket for Medical treatment was
not resorted to in the case? he said his transmission ^{to} the Work-
house was all he had to do with, I remained in charge and visited
Molloy a second time on the 14th Inst & wrote to the Relieving
Officer that he could be removed with safety, I received another
letter from the Relieving Officer on the 18th Inst saying, Molloy's wife
had reported her husband to be much worse, on the day after I saw him
& that he could not live over a day or two & asked me to visit him again.
This I know to be a case, & wrote in answer that it was not necessary for me to see
him again, as I had well considered his case, & that he was fit for removal, but that
his wife told me on the occasion ^{of my} first visit that "under no circumstances
would she permit him to go to the Workhouse," all this time I never was asked
to prescribe for him, & I never, in private or Dispensary practice, gave any
advice on any person, so on the 21st Inst, the wife came to the Dispensary at
Craanford & said "her husband was then worse & had stoppage of Urine & what was to
be done? I told her she never sought advice from me & that what she wanted (a continuance
of out door relief) was to be had from the Relieving Officer & not from me, but was her
^{husband's} will as she described, he would have the advantage of two visits in the day or oftener
if required from the Doctor at the Workhouse, which I could not possibly give him,
had she even sought it, so she left me in a rage & as she descended the stairs I
heard her use the following uncomplimentary language towards me "I will leave
his death on you, you took all he had from him - you old rogue" what more she
said I could not hear but I dare say the persons down stairs did, the above state-
ment of facts elicits one observation only from me, viz, had I continued
to advise that out door Relief be given to Molloy for six months did remain
so long in charge of Barnstaple District, and he to live, one syllable of this
charge would never have been thought of, but because I exercised a con-
sistent discretion on the subject, I am abused first, & then a charge of neglecting to do
what I never was required, is ^{trumped} ~~transferred~~ up against me & which if encouraged
by the Guardians, they may take my word for it, Out door Relief will soon
become the rule, & not the exception.

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The Roman Catholic Chaplain's Report,

March 22nd 1861. —

By order of the Board of Guardians of this Union Mr. Hoop has kindly informed me, "that in conformity with the Commissioners letter a Committee was appointed to inquire into, and consider the capability of Isaac Pomeroy changing his Religion & that the said Committee unanimously agreed that said Isaac Pomeroy was of sound mind and perfectly capable of changing his Religion & that his Registry was consequently changed from being a Protestant to be a Roman Catholic — "May I ask the Guardians of this Board why they did not adopt the suggestion of Mr. Oshaugman when at the next he proposed for the solution of this extraordinary case, the very identical course as has been recommended by the Commissioners, for my part I cannot see any other reason save, that it was somewhat too off-handed a way to get this business & that by adopting such a course certain members would not have had an opportunity of deciding by vote the man's insanity, though they never had laid an eye upon him. — Certainly this is a novel instance of making a man insane viz. by vote & no doubt respects on the part of the Gentlemen who have attempted it an amount of Reverence such I consider as is not possessed by men even of the highest Medical Standing. —

In reading over the report of proceedings at the Board on last Saturday^{week} I find that my conduct has been considerably censured by some of the Guardians Mr. Peter Roe is reported to have said "that I had no right to interfere with the man until word would come from the Commissioners" It appears now that the man is of sound mind and was from the beginning quite competent to change his Religion — should the man have died before word had come from the Commissioners what would ^{have} been the consequence? In that case had I neglected visiting him I consider that my conduct would have been greatly exposed to censure &

Mr. Warren stated that the man was registered a Protestant & that consequently I ought not have interfered with him" then according to Mr. Warren, there is no liberty of conscience for a mere pauper shut up within the walls of a Workhouse prison even in this much boasted land of liberty

Permit me to inform the Gentlemen in question that he has erred,
 Another Gentleman, Mr Doyne, who was Chairman on the occasion
 "maintained that no Clergyman has a right to visit a man on such
 an occasion until his registration be changed & that I came here
 & said I will do as I like" and though this is not ^{exactly} the style of
 language I would expect from a ~~man~~ Gentleman of Mr Doyne's rank
 and position as the gentleman has thought well to express himself
 in this manner he has stated what is partly true and partly false
 - always in the discharge of what I consider to me my duty, to use Mr
 Doyne's own ungentlemanly expression "I will do as I like" that is
 what I believe to be right & not as Mr Doyne or any other Guardian
 or any ^{num-} ~~number~~ of Guardians like I need not observe that in any other
 sense his words do not apply, &

In reply to Mr Butler sweeping
 assertions that "I had no right to interfere with any one ^{at all} in the Home
 as I was not the Chaplain & that I did not enter my name as such
 at the bottom of my report," - Really one would imagine that Mr
 Butler must have been asleep or away in the centre of a forest

 astounding assertion - I suppose there is in his opinion in order to be

Mr. Butler may call me acting or non-acting Chaplain whichever pleases his fancy best, - To me it is a matter of very little importance with which of these titles he may think fit to designate me, I will merely tell the gentleman that it is hardly worth his while troubling himself about me as it is not likely that any remarks he may choose to make will ever have the slightest effect upon me in the capacity of Chaplain - As to the other remarks that were made, I pass them over, I considered them undeserving any notice, I will only add that it is a hard case when a poor pauper in a Workhouse wants to change his religion, he is to be branded with inanity & I venture to assert that never before in any Workhouse was exhibited such a piece of intolerant bigotry, as was manifested by the conduct of some of the Guardians of this Union in the case of Isaac Ponder.

With regard to the removal of the Assistant Nurse, Mrs. Crow from over the room where Isaac Ponder is, I intended to make one or two observations but as I understand Mr. Pierce & Stone has given notice that he will on to-morrow week, move to have her replaced over same room I will leave her care in his hands, I will merely remark that when it comes to a poll it is likely the Gentlemen's motion will be lost, by an over whelming majority. But should Mr. Stone call for an investigation (as I am sure he will, the truth perhaps ^{may} ~~will~~ come out & then it will be seen whether the Cause of Complaint was sufficient to warrant the ⁱⁿ removing her before the case was decided at the Board, I requested Mr. Middleton not to remove till her conduct would be submitted to the Board, but it seems he could ^{not} act on his own authority in this case, as the woman was actually removed by him before the Board decided against her, though when Isaac Ponder called ^{on} him to send for the Priest for him the Gentlemen's consciences would not suppose allow him to do so till he would have the sanction of the Board which he well knew he would hardly obtain.

In conclusion I beg to offer my best thanks to Messrs. Mum, and O'Shaughnessy for the honorable and straight forward manner in which they supported the Cause of poor Isaac Ponder,
