Letter from the Commissioners No ¹³³¹/₁₈₄₈ 11th January 1848. Relating to the Security to be given by the Clerk. Stating that the Bond to be executed should be a joint & several Bond in an equal sum, and ~~stating~~ that the penalty should not be less than £500. a form of Bond duly filled was enclosed therewith, and the Clerk was desired to submit the same with this letter to the Board at their next meeting. — Clerk was directed to ~~return~~ this Security in ~~attendance~~ that form. Bond must be perfect.
 Letter from the Commissioners No ¹⁹³⁶/₁₈₄₈ 14th January 1848
 acknowledging the Clerk's letter of the 11th instant, and stating that under the circumstances described therein the Relieving Officers would be warranted in affording out door relief to the women under the 1st Section of the Irish Poor Relief Extension Act.

Letter from the Commissioners No ²²⁹/₁₈₄₈ 14th January 1848, stating that they had forwarded therewith for the information of the Board of Guardians, a letter which they had received from the Reverend Mr Lany applying for an increase of his salary as Roman Catholic Chaplain of the Workhouse, and that the Commissioners propose to increase the Roman Catholic Chaplain's salary from the present date to £50 per annum, on the understanding that if the Guardians take any additional building in the Town Mr Lany

Letter from Rev James Lacy P.O. P.B. Chaplain to the Young Union Workhouse ^{28th December 1847} Applying to the Commissioners for an increase of Salary in consequence of the great increase in his duties.

Letter from the Clerk of the Shillelagh Union ^{January 14th 1848} acknowledging the receipt of a letter from the Clerk of the Young Union, and stating that the Board of Guardians of the Shillelagh Union had examined Stephen Murphy, who stated that he had been living 10 Months in Carrow and the three years previously in Rosmaragogues Ho Workhouse which they conceive entitles him to relief from the Young Board of Guardians - The Board admitted Stephen Murphy & family, and desired the Clerk to write to the Commissioners laying the entire case before them.

Letter from the Earl of Countess Chairman of the Finance Committee applying for £11-5-11 being the sum required an estimate for the ensuing fortnight for the Fever Hospital - ~~Orders~~

Letter from the Clerk of the Mullingar Union, containing some Resolutions of that Board made at the Meeting on the 21st of December 1847, Relation to the renting or purchasing of land in the vicinity of Workhouses for the purpose of Relieving the paupers unemployed.

Letter from the Very Rev Dean Newlands, accompanied by an abstract of the accounts of the late Committee of Relief, now finally closed and transmitting a cheque for £22-0-5 the residue of the funds - The Clerk was desired to forward the Cheque to the Treasurer to be placed to the Credit of the Young Electoral Division.

The Act 6 and 7 Victoria Cap 92 Sec 2. points out three Courses for the object:— 1 By action or Suit in the Superior Courts with the consent of the Commissioners. 2 By ^{civil Bill in the Court of Chancery} action or Suit in the Superior Jurisdiction. 3 When the Lessor resides in any County part of which may be in the Union by Complaint to any Justice on Warrant after fifteen days notice, and summons thereupon to appear before such Justice in Petty Session. The Commissioners state that whenever application may be made to them for their consent to proceed in the Superior Courts, it will be necessary to transmit a Bill of the Immediate Lessors proposed to be used in such manner stating their places of abode the total amount due by each, and the grounds on which proceeding by action appears necessary.

Letter from the Commissioners No 35. 30 ^{M/48} 15th January 1848 Relative to an order under their seal which they intend to issue in each Union restricting the number of inmates in the Workhouse &c at any one time, and requesting the Guardians will direct their Medical Officers to furnish them immediately with any Suggestions he may wish to make in reference to the numbers proposed, as the Commissioners desire the order with as little delay as possible. — The Board directed the Clerk to write to the Commissioners stating the amount of Workhouse accommodation.

Circular from the Commissioners No 55 ^{M/48} 18th January 1848 desiring to draw the attention to a portion of their Circular of the 14th of August last, relative to the reservation of the present Workhouse accommodation as a general rule for the relief of such able bodied persons not falling within the first Section of the Extension Act

as may be deemed destitute, and stating that the Commissioners are prepared to approve (for the present) the discharge of persons from the Workhouse who may fall within any of the three classes specified in Section 1 and who may be deemed properly and sufficiently provided for by a weekly allowance out of the Workhouse. 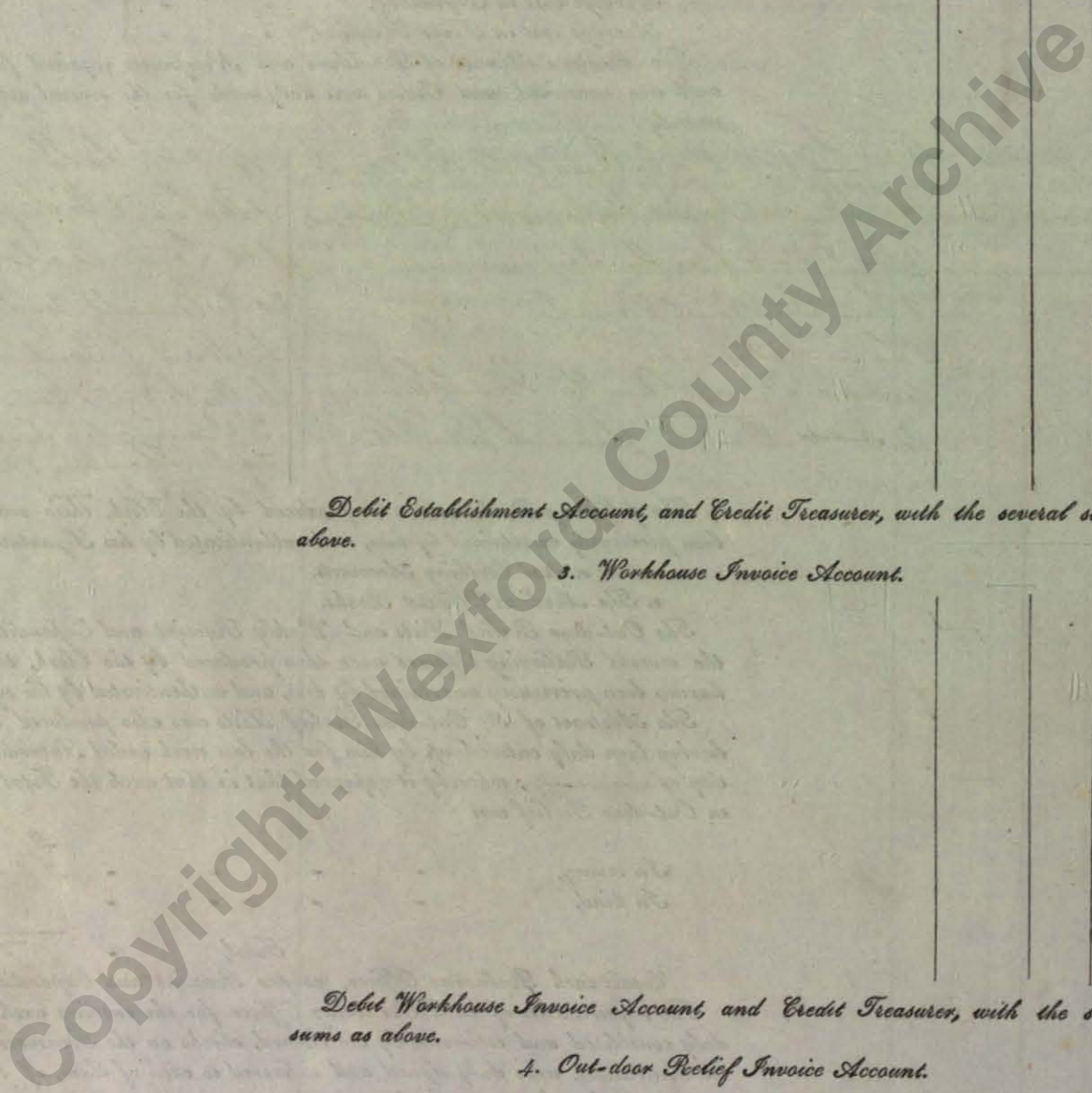

Observations of Mr W. W. Gifford No 6347/48. February 14th 1848. Stating that the Dormitory accommodation of this house has been considerably increased without any corresponding increase of Dayrooms. That he would advise that some temporary building be provided for the Idiots pending the erection of the Pauper Lunatic Asylum about to be built, or otherwise by the using of Dayrooms some of the New Wards on the upper floors of the Idiot Building which have been recently erected. And that this is the only way of meeting the inconvenience, unless by the erection of a new building for the women with Infant Children.

Letter from the Commissioners No 183 ⁹⁷/1848. 18th February 1848. Calling the attention of the Guardians of the Lymington Union to the order regulating the contributions of Unions to the Audit Fund under which order an Statement of £ 4-0-0 was due by this Union on the 1st of January last, and requesting that this amount may be paid to the Audit Fund as early as may be practicable.

Letter from the Commissioners No 7264 ₁₈₄₈ 23rd February 1848. Stating that they had under consideration a Minute of Proceedings of the Board of Guardians on the 12th instant from which it appears that the Returning Officer has been at the Workhouse enquiring for the Books in which the claims to be paid by parson are entered, and that they cannot be found.

Resolution from the Commissioners of the Board of Health 12th September 1848. for the Continuance of Medical Relief by Means of the Temporary Fever Hospital at Gooey under the Unsanitary Law Act 12 Vic. c. 131. - The Clerk received Directions to Summon a Special Meeting of the Board to take under Consideration this Resolution on this day week.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or, Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

Copy of letter from the Poor Law Commissioners to the Clerk of the North Dublin Union 11th July 1848. left by Joseph Cutler Post Poor Law Inspector to be read to the Board and entered in full in the Minutes. as follows

"Poor Law Commission Office Dublin 11th July 1848"

Sir - The Commissioners for administering the laws for Relief of the Poor in Ireland, have had their utmost pains to a practice which they are informed prevails among the Poor Rate Collectors and the Dublin Unions, of accepting payment on account of Rates, instead of insisting upon payment of the whole amount due. - The evils of this practice are clearly pointed out in a report which the Commissioners have received from Capt. Rutledge and observes - The Case of Mr. Drummond, in the North Dublin Union, being now disposed of by the surrender of his Rights, and his acknowledgment of his default, they to offer a few observations upon matters which attracted my attention during the course of the investigation, which, ^{from Capt. Rutledge} ^{in the North Dublin Union} upon the charges brought and fully proved, against the above named Collector, It transpired during that investigation that the Collectors are generally in the habit of collecting various sums of money on account of Rates, and that with but one exception (Mr. W. Anon at present one of the Rural Collectors), they do not lodge them to the Credit of the Union, nor do they give the Rate payers any printed receipt (except in Mr. W. Anon's case), but merely an acknowledgment on plain Paper, when the Ratepayer pays the balance, he gets one of the regular printed receipts of the Union, and the Collector is then obliged to lodge the ^{amount} Rates into the Treasurer of the Union, Now without meaning to say anything in disparagement of the integrity of the present Collectors of the Union, I think that this system directly encourages fraud, and is moreover a grievous violation of the Law in respect to the Collection of the Rates, and all they know is that a Collector who has a regular warrant from the Board of Guardians of the Union comes out there and demands the Rates and they pay; if poor or distressed they will pay on account, thinking that they are then fully discharged from so much of their liability, where now the Collector may get as long as he receives, only the part of a Rate, he can keep that in his pocket, but must account to the Union when he receives the balance. There are several disadvantages referred to by Captain Rutledge as incidental to this practice, for example - "If the Rate is paid before the balance is paid the whole amount of the Rate is necessarily carried forward, and when a new Collector commences collecting in the district, he has no knowledge of such payments on account unless there is some private understanding between himself and his predecessor on the subject"

"If a change of tenants take place before the balance is paid, or if the former become waste, all ^{cases} of payment on account unless many can be lost, and in the one instance the new tenant may be called upon for the entire Rate, and in the other the rate may be declared irrecoverable, and in either case the sum paid on account may be retained by the Collector. In pointing out these consequences of the practice referred to, the Commissioners do not intend to reflect upon the integrity or trustworthiness of any of the Collectors, they merely wish to point out the evils of a system which they are informed prevails, and which unauthorised as it is by the Commissioners regulations, is clearly objectionable, as affording facility for fraud on the part of the Collector, if disposed to avail himself of it. — The Commissioners have therefore that the Guardians will concur with them in thinking that a system of collecting which exposes the Rate payer to fraud and the Collector to suspicion should in justice to both parties be discontinued, and the Commissioners demand the same to point out that the practice is directly at variance with the provisions of a general order regulating the duties of the Collector; the second article of which requires the Collector to give receipts for poor rates from the Receipt Book, and intimated by the Clerk in the manner prescribed by the articles, and further provides that ^{he shall give} no other receipt for Poor rates whatever, on pain of dismissal from his office, and prosecution for the penalties which he may incur by Statute for a breach of his regulations.

The Report of the Medical Officer of the Genny Fever Hospital
 for the year ending on the 31st of September 1848
 was read, and the Club was directed to enter it in full on the
 Minutes. it is as follows. Genny September 30th 1848
 "My Lord. In Compliance with the wishes of the Board of Guardians I
 proceed to lay before you the following report - The Genny
 Fever Hospital was originally built by the County and came
 under the Control of the Board of Health on the 15th of June 47.
 It was placed under the Management of the Board of Guardians
 on the 30th September 1847 - This being the first Annual Report
 and the Subject of Fever Hospital Expenditure occupying a
 considerable Share of Public Attention I wish to enter with
 some Minuteness into the Subject of Dietary & General economy.
 The ordinary Diet Consists of White Bread and fresh Milk,
 one pound & a half of Bread and one quart of Milk & dinner,
 Extras are made up of Tea and Sugar, Beef Broth, Stewage,
 Flour and Milk & Atticant, generally speaking I do not use
 Wine or Whiskey, a few bottles of Port have been ordered,
 The Class of persons met with in a Fever Hospital, accustomed to
 inferior food, recover more slowly when not subjected
 to high ^{standards} stimuli, and I have found good bread and
 Milk restore them to health more certainly than any
 other Mode of treatment; the whole Cost of Extras during
 the year amounts to £9-15-6. It will be found that
 in many Fever Hospitals Extras form the most expensive
 Item, amounting to some hundreds of pounds.
 The ^{work} Nursing has been entirely done by the Nurses and
 their assistants the latter I have taken out of the Workhouse
 from among those trained in the Infirmary I also
 make use of Convalescents in the Hospital as occasional
 officers. This accounts for the Cost of Nurses being so
 unusually small. I find in a Statement of Fever
 Hospital expenses published by the Poor Law
 Commissioners an item in one Hospital of
 £46-6-8 paid to Nurses during the Month of
 May 1848 - the number of Patients being
 150 & dinner, whereas in the Genny Fever

Hospital the Cost of Nurses for 50 Patients a day, for
one Month is only £3-16-0 - The rations allowed to
Nurses in the General Hospital is the ordinary Bread
& Milk sent up the Hospital, nothing extra. They require
in Money as follows, one at 7^s, one at 8^s - one at 6^s,
one at 4^s & day. Although Fever is very prevalent
and highly contagious, it is not so malignant as it
was last year, nor are relapses so frequent, many remain
a long time in Hospital, ^{the} attribute much to the
want of a Convalescent ward, and though I have
in some Cases, aided recovery, by removal from
one house to the other, yet when both houses are
full, it is of little use. There are many objections
to conducting the Fever Hospital accommodation
in two distinct Houses, as it must lead to
both to irregularity and expense. The Number
of Patients admitted into the General Hospital
during the last two years has been 5 times as
many as in former years. The Patients under
treatment from September 1847 to the end of
September 1848 amount to 610, the Deaths
35 - at present in the house 49. the Mortality
~~is under~~ is under 6 per Cent - the general
average of Mortality in similar establishments
is about 8 per Cent. in some instances it
has reached 14 per Cent. There appears every
inclination on the part of the Poor people to
avail themselves of the Hospital when
attacked with Fever, they come from all
parts of the Union - the rule is to admit any person
actually under Fever, even without any
written recommendation - this however seldom
occurs.

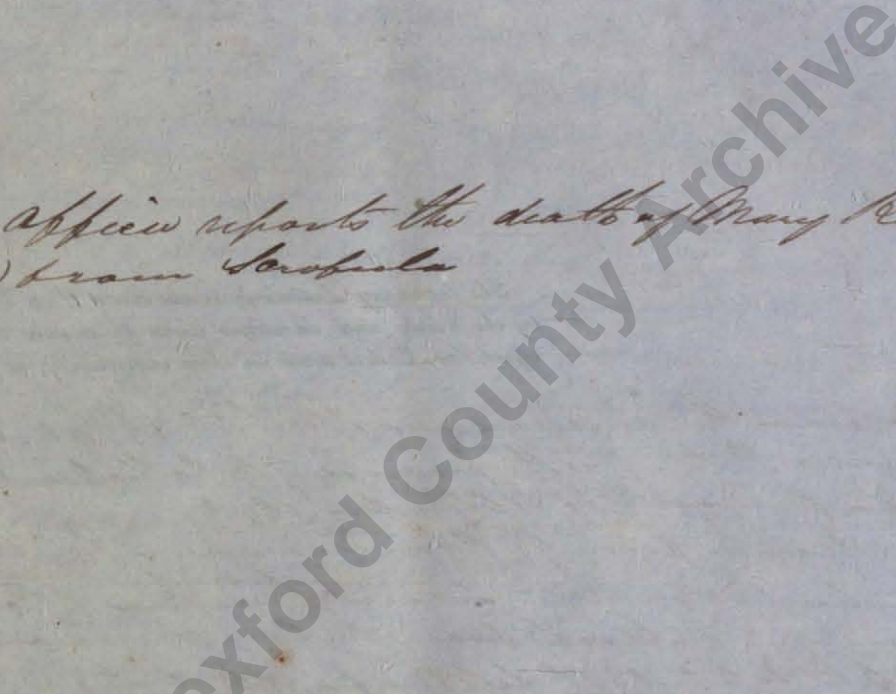

The Club reports that William Johnston the late Collector for the Manamatin & Wells Collecting District had lodged with the Board the entire amount, which remained in his hands at the credit of the Board of these Divisions at the time of his dismissal being £52-5-6. Provision from the Commissioners of Health 10th October 1848. Requiring the Board of Guardians to make provision for the accommodation of Poor Persons affected by Fever or other Epidemic Disease in this Union by the continuance of the Fever Hospital at Guelph, also requiring them to appoint a Medical Officer ^{& such Hospital} and fix his Salary. Subject to the approval of the Commissioners of Health, of the Medical Officer and Salary so fixed.

The Clerk is directed to write to the Board of Guardians of the Union (who it is supposed have received a similar Provision to the above) relative to the appointment of a Medical Officer to the Fever Hospital - Stating that the Board of Guardians of the Union propose the amount of Salary to be paid the Medical Officer to the Hospital in question to be £70 per annum, and that although the portion of the Union which can be benefited by this Institution is far greater than the portion of this Union peculiarly circumstanced, yet the Board of Guardians of this Union are satisfied to pay half by the proposed Salary to the Medical Officer. Say £35 per annum. The Clerk is further to state that the Board of Guardians of this Union recommend a further part for such appointments Doctor being the Medical Officer at present in charge of the Hospital.

Letter from the Commissioners of Health No 1411 - 1848. 4th November 1848. Enquiring what Steps (if any) that have been taken to elect a Medical Officer to the Dublin Fever Hospital and fix his Salary in pursuance to the Resolution addressed to the Board of Guardians some time since. In response to the Subject of this Letter it is proposed by Lord Clifden and seconded by Mr Purcell that Doctor Barney be appointed Medical Officer to the Dublin Fever Hospital on the terms proposed by the Quiniscorthy Board viz that the Salary of that Officer be £100 per annum to be paid in equal proportions by the Quiniscorthy and Quinny Unions - The Clerk is to notify same to Doctor Barney and report it to the Board of Health.

Circular from the Com. L. No. Commissioners No 837 - 11/48. 3rd November 1848 relative to the formation of Commissions under the Misadvers Removal and Disposal Provisions Act, also Making some observations relative to the issue of Distresses and

regulations under the hands of two or more of the Commissioners of Health, which it appears by the 10th Section of the above mentioned act is necessary to enable the Board of Guardians to discharge any of the functions set forth in that and the following Sections. — It is resolved with reference to this letter that the Club be directed to make enquiry from the Commissioners of Health whether they will allow Writings and regulations signed in their hands to empower the Board of Guardians to take on themselves the discharge of the functions set forth in the 10th and following Sections of the act 11 & 12 Vic Cap 123. Provided the Board of Guardians make Application to the Commissioners of Health for the same.

Circular from the Commissioners No 57. 657. 9th November 1848. Giving directions relative to the preservation by the Club of the plans and specifications of any building now in course of erection or about to be erected in connexion with the Workhouse.

Letter from the Commissioners No 557. 1848. 9th November 1848 expressing the Commissioners approval of the appointment of Mr James Shabert W. Pelling Officer for the Camelin & Dalrymple District of this Union on the terms proposed.

Stating the inability of the Commission to approve of the appointment of Mr Henry Dalton as Police Officer for the Princes Street Division of the City of Dublin, having had under consideration the circumstances under which Mr Dalton was required to resign the office which he formerly held of Master of the Workhouse, and requesting that the Guardians will be good enough to proceed to the appointment of some other person.

Moved by Mr Foley and seconded by Mr Aughton that Mr Matthew Roche who proposed for that situation on the 4th inst be now appointed Clerk. Mr John Aughton of Courtown Barlow and Mr Thomas McCann were approved of as his Secretaries in the joint and several sum of £500.

Let the Board the Commissioners No. 505/55 10th November 1848 in reference to a Minute of the Board relative to the chargeability of Mary Finney and joining it as the opinion of the Commissioners that, that pauper is still chargeable to the Westgate Electoral Division.

The Board of Charles Leary to Supply Coffees for the West Electoral Division at the following prices for 12 months from this date was accepted viz 3 purling & under 2/8. 3 purl to 4 purl 3/6. 4 purl to 5 purl 5/3; and his Secretaries James Hanrahan of Pilsnery and Dennis Byrne of Afton were approved of.
