COPY of MINUTES of Proceedings of the Board of Guardians, at a Meeting held on *Saturday* the *24th* day of *November* 184*9*

PRESENT: In the Chair, *The Earl of Courtown.*

The Minutes of last Meeting were read and Signed.

The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. *1071* to No. *1114*, both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated from No. *2254* to No. *2274*, inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read, to the following effect:

The Clerk reports that he advertised for two Kitchen Birlow as agents, and for securing the Meadow Access. Wrote to the Clerk of the University Union, requesting information relative to Coal. Checked the accounts of the divisions of the Union. That he should visit the house of Messrs Lambton and Kelly, Gate Payers, and report relative to them to the Board by Thursday. Wrote to Mr. Williams Clothing Merchant inquiring how the Board hope to be able to pay him his account on next Saturday. Announced the Board to meet on Tuesday for the purpose of taking into consideration the Clerk's notice of resignation. Passed Notice to be posted in regard to the Public of the day, upon which the Board require to be kept of the names of the persons retained out of the Coal Rates in this Union are entered under the heads of Landed Estates, will be open for the Election of Gate Payers.

 Letter from the Medical Officer of the Workhouse 24th November 1849. Respecting the substitution of White Beans instead of Beans in the Workhouse Diet, also the use of half a pint of Sweet Milk instead of the pint of Cattle Milk, and that the alterations be made with one fourth part of Peas from a few pounds with the hope of arresting the Epidemic to Cholera now existing in the West of England and of the same time improving the Dairy that 20 cases of Cholera have arisen since Monday last of which 9 have been fatal. — The alterations in the Workhouse Diet suggested by the Medical Officer, are approved of by the Board and ordered.

 Letter from the late Schoolmistress 25th November 1849. With reference to her account for Salary. Stating that she ought not to be subject to the deduction in Salary proposed by the Board since the 1st inst. as she had given notice of her resignation before the alteration was made. — Ordered that the difference in Salary claimed by the late Schoolmistress be paid her on next Saturday.

 Letter from John Deane late Cook of the Workhouse 17th November 1849. Requesting to be allowed three Suits of Clothes according to his original agreement. (The consideration of which subject was postponed from last Saturday) — In reference to the Minutes of the appointment of the late Cook it appears there are no orders granted for his Claims. It is therefore resolved that he be paid £10 on leave of say 10 shillings which he may be entitled to, as the Board understand that he will be satisfied with this sum.

 Letter from John Deane a Purser in the House (with a date) stating that he has undertaken the situation of Cook at the request of the Board, and finding the Work very laborious he requests to be allowed some additional Rations, and Clothing different from other Purser. — Ordered that John Deane be allowed a Supper consisting of 1 lb of Brown Bread and 1/2 a Pint of Sweet Milk, also 2 Apples.

 Letter from John Gily of Rathdown in the Parish of St. Vincent's 14th November 1849. Stating that he is afflicted with Poor Rates on a House and piece of land which he ought not to be liable for. — It is the opinion of the Board that in this case Mr Gily's only remedy is to appeal.

12  
 The Report of the Provisional Valuator as directed to be made at the Board of last Meeting relative to the Receipts of the Workhouse for the year ending 31st Decr 1848. It was resolved that the matter be referred to the Poor Rate Collectors to be reported at their Meeting on next Monday.

- 13 The Sum of £1000 was accepted to supply the sum of £1000 of Good Way  
Shaw at 2<sup>d</sup> of 1847 was accepted.
- 14 The Clerk's Report of Resignation having been taken into  
consideration as intended on this day the following Resolution was  
passed: "The Board wish to express their great regret that Mr. Doughton  
should have considered it necessary to resign his Situation as Clerk  
of this Union - and they desire at the same time to assure him  
that in the reduction of his Salary they have been actuated not by any  
undervaluing of his Services, or Merits, but from pure Motives  
of economy - Should however Mr. Doughton still persevere in  
his intention of resigning, the Board consider it best to have  
some other person appointed to his Situation, and they desire that  
Mr. Doughton should be satisfied with the Situation he has filled in this Union  
with so much Satisfaction & Advantage to the Board, and to the  
Public."
- Resolved that a Clerk be appointed for the Salary of £80  
in addition to which, Clerk is to take in the advertisement that an  
Annual Fee of £10 will be allowed for the performance of the duties  
of Returning Officer, and that out of those Fees the person  
appointed must provide all the expenses he may require.
- It will be indispensable that Candidates shall be in attendance  
at the Election to take place on the 8<sup>th</sup> of December next.
- 15 At the Request of the Board the Clerk consented to remain  
until the 1<sup>st</sup> of January next, to assist the person who may  
be appointed to the Situation.
- 16 Resolved that the Commissioners' Secretaries be requested  
to the appointment of Mr. Carey as Returning Officer for  
the Carrick District, and to the appointment of Mr. [unclear]  
of the Workhouse, as the Commissioners' Secretaries to those  
appointments had not yet been received.
- 17 Clerk informs the Board that there is a Cheque  
which was issued to Mr. Shaw Clothing Contractor on the 5<sup>th</sup>  
of May last (No 63 amount £16-7-11) still outstanding, and  
that the Treasurer recommends that Mr. Shaw be desired to  
have it presented as soon as possible, as it is objectionable  
to pay Cheques of such long Standing - ordered that Mr.  
Shaw be desired to request that he will have this Cheque  
presented for payment as soon as possible.
- 18 It is resolved that "Coyne House" the late Burgill's  
Workhouse built by the Board be taken for a Cholera Hospital,  
Mr. [unclear] the Representative of the Union having been  
sent for, sending this House to the Board for 3 Months for the  
sum of £8. which was agreed to by the Board.

Next Meeting of the Guardians to be held on Saturday the 1<sup>st</sup>  
day of December 1847.

- 5 1849 With reference to the Council General which is in contemplation to provide for the removal of Paupers. - Requesting the attention of the Guardians to the appointment of a proper Council General for the district and to the duty of Poor persons dying of cholera but of Paupers who may die in the district and requesting that the Commissioners may be informed what arrangements are present exist for the burial of Paupers. - Clerk reports that he has informed the Commissioners that the Board of Guardians have appointed a person by a person employed for the purpose (of the cost of 5/- each) to the Council General of Association or Association (both situated about a mile distance from the Workhouse), or to any of the Council General in the neighbourhood where liberty may be obtained for interment, and are there interested.
- 6 Letter from the Commissioners No 746/13/49. 14th December 1849. With reference to the proposition made on Saturday last relative to the manner to be adopted in future Elections of Officers. - Requesting attention to the Poor Law Act 1834 and the subject, and to the Commission General Population of 1844. and stating that it appears to the Commissioners that the proper Officer where there is a number of candidates would be to put to the vote the appointment of one of them after the usual nominations, and if he have a Majority the question is decided: if not, a Motion for the appointment.



The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year).

13 Letter from Mr. Lee, Apothecary to the Guardians, requesting that the Board, in answer to their letter, that he might undertake the treatment of Cholera in the East London Dispensary District, should advise him thereon, and suggesting directions with regard to the application he is to attend to. 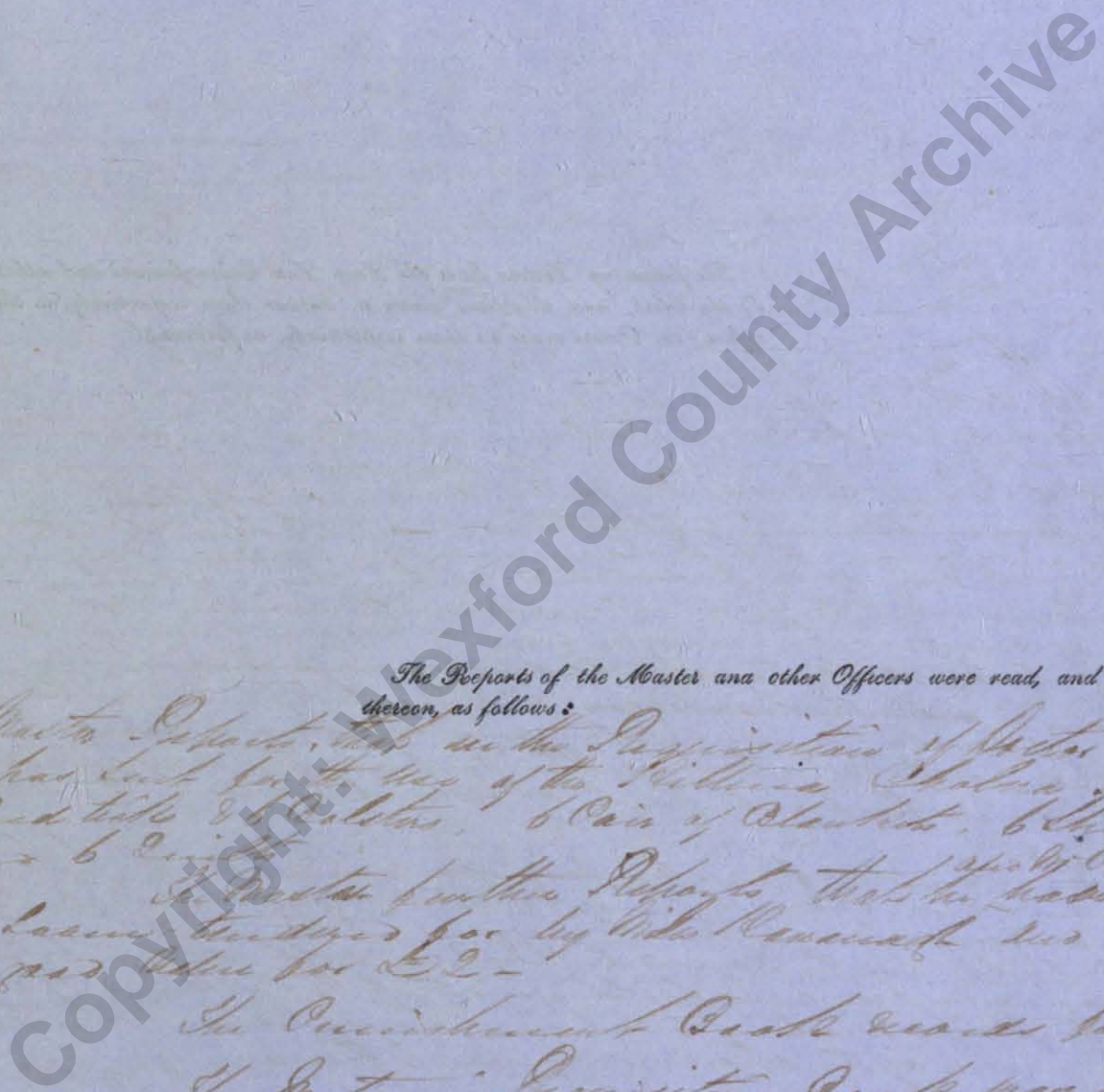

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, or, Orders made on them respectively, as follows:

- 1 Circular from the Commissioners No 202 27/49. 20th Decr 1849. Calling for Returns of the gross expenses to the 1st of September last. Showing the limitation of that date and proportion of the year's expenses incurred by each Division of the Union. - Clerk reports that he forwards these Returns.
- 2 Letter from the Commissioners No 202 27/49. 21st Decr 1849. In reply to the Board's enquiries relative to the appeal against the Rate of the Operative Electors Division embracing the Parish. That the Court can order the value of the said parish to be inserted in the Rate Book. That the Commissioners do not consider that the submission of those particulars are such as to invalidate the Rate, and stating that the Commissioners think that the collection of the Rate should be proceeded with as if no appeal were made.
- 3 Letter from the Commissioners No 202 27/49. 21st Decr 1849. Calling for a Return so soon as possible of the 1st Messuage Showing the Number of Inhabitants in the Union on the 1st of January 1846 and 1845 respectively, classifying such information according to the respective headings of the Returns.
- 4 Letter from the Commissioners No 202 28/49. 21st Decr 1849. Acknowledging the receipt of Replies to their enquiries respecting Mr W M Higginbotham as Clerk to the Guardians of this Union, and expressing the Commissioners approval of his appointment in the terms specified.
- 5 Letter from Messrs Woodroffe and Wilson Solicitors 21st Decr 1849. Acknowledging the receipt of a Notice of appeal and a letter summarizing the instructions of the Board relative to the appeal of same, and informing the Clerks that their instructions shall be attended to - Clerk informs the Board that he had a conversation with Mr Woodroffe relative



to the defence of the appeal, and that that question states he will find it difficult to get Counsel to undertake the defence of the appeal, for I quince and that he wishes to be informed how he may get under such circumstances - Orders that Mr. Mackay be instructed to return Counsel at the usual fee given on such occasions.

It is desired to request that the Designing Valuator will obtain the necessary particulars which was sought from the Rate Books of the Cavalry Electoral Division in regard to its being a League, so as to be able to insert them in the Rate Books of that Division should the Assistant Quarter be made it.

Letter from Mr. J. Liberty Solicitor in connection with the effect that the Widow of the late Moses Goffin does not hold land in the Mills Electoral Division notwithstanding which she has been applied to by the Rate Bookers of the Mills Electoral Division for Rates - Reported to the Collection Committee.

1849. Forwarded his Diplomas together with a letter from the Secretary of the Apothecaries of Ireland, referring to several acts of Parliament which recognize the rank of Apothecary as a Medical Practitioner -

11 The London of John Sheehy to Supply the Hospital with Bedsteads at 4/6 for 12 Months from the date was accepted.

12 The London of George Deane to Supply three of Mr. Shepard's Bedsteads for the London of 19/6 per week was accepted.

15 Mr James McIntyre, Officer of the Quaker Electoral Division, is authorized to hire a room for an office in Cavalah at £3 per three Months and it is allowed that the rent of same shall be advanced from the 15th inst as it appears that Mr James occupies a room as an office in that Village since that time.

16 Informations were given by the Vestry against James James, James Richards, and Richard Hudson for deserting their families and leaving their destitute.

Clerk submits a copy of this return to the Board the original of which was forwarded to the Commissioners office on the 1<sup>st</sup> instant.
- 3 Letter from the Commissioners No 388/49 2<sup>nd</sup> January 1850 in answer to the Clerks letter of the 24<sup>th</sup> 1849 relative to the balance remaining to be retained by the Collectors of the Groyt Union at the close of each week directing the Clerk to note on the Abstract the amount of half pence which may have been acknowledged by the treasurer at the time the collectors attend for the examination of their accounts.
- 4 Circular from the Commissioners No 42/50 2<sup>nd</sup> January 1850 regarding the particulars respecting the current rates on that Union - Clerk reports that he furnished this statement.
- 5 Circular from the Commissioners No 760/50 3<sup>rd</sup> January 1850 Calling for a return of expenses and statistics of this Union for the month of December 1849 - Clerk is directed to furnish this return.
- 6 Letter from the Commissioners No 540/50 4<sup>th</sup> January 1850. Relating to a minute of the Board of Guardians of the Groyt Union of the 29<sup>th</sup> 1849 from which it appears that the master reports to the Board as to the necessity of granting without delay relief for the orphan child proposed in Emigrants to Australia and following every precaution in the subject. The Commissioners state that it is

Communicated with the Commission officer Lieutenant Henry in refer-  
 ence to the parties selected by him and the Guardians Minutes of  
 the 1<sup>st</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> Decem<sup>r</sup> or respectively relating to Margaret & Mary Slaughter  
 and Mary Kelly. The Commissioners enclose a copy of a test which they have  
 secured from Lieutenant Henry of the validity of the certificates he  
 considers valid and Lieutenant Henry recognises that certificates should  
 be prepared for eight. The Commissioners think that arrangements can  
 be made if the Guardians desire it to send out the whole of the ten,  
 but Lieutenant Henry suggests that it would be advisable to fix upon  
 eight of the number included on the test and the Commissioners require  
 the Guardians to make arrangements for that purpose in due time for  
 the ship which is to sail in the beginning of next month by which  
 the emigrants can be sent out of the recent epidemic shall have  
 passed off. The Commissioners request that they may be fur-  
 nished with a report from the Medical Officer of the Dublin of  
 Cholera as soon as he can report the fact and consider that the Emigrants  
 can leave the workhouse consistently with the safety of those Emigrants  
 with whom they may be sent out.

 to any interested person of whom they apply for them, and also to  
 acknowledge receipt of them and keep a list of the persons  
 to whom he issues them. Clerk reports he has complied with the  
 Commissioners orders.

9 Letter from Major Woodcock & Wilson Messrs the appeal against  
 the rate in the Carnish Electoral Division was made before the  
 Assistant Barometer and that same was quashed on the grounds  
 that inasmuch as the rate book did not contain the names  
 of the occupiers for whom their immediate lessors are primarily  
 liable and that the Act of Parliament did not give them power

16 On the recommendation of the Medical Officers of the Workhouse it was resolved that the following alterations be made in the Dietary, viz that Breakfast to be made up of Rice for each pauper and the dinner to be made of equal parts of Indian Meal and Potatoes.

17 Clerk is directed to advertise for tenders for supplying the Workhouse with Meal and Flour for three months from the 1st of February 1850.

The Clerk's Report of Vaccination was read—(this on the first meeting in every month.) Number of successful cases.

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and Orders were made thereon as follows: No<sup>d</sup> Report.

The Chairman reports that in consequence of so many cases of Cholera occurring in the Workhouse, the death of the schoolmaster and the severe illness of the assistant schoolmaster during the past week, he had authorized the medical officer to call in a medical assistant, and to employ a person named Laurence Murphy to take charge of the school. Also to remove the cholera patients to the Hospital taken for the reception of persons who are not inmates of the Workhouse, the wooden house having become full. Moved by Colonel Owen and seconded by Lord Stafford that these proceedings be confirmed by the Board—Carried unanimously.

The Chairman also reports that he wrote to the Commissioners during the past week informing them that there were manure banks at the rear of the Building which were calculated to spread sickness amongst the inmates, and recommending them to send down their architect—Mr Wilkinson the Commissioners Architect being an attendant in recommending that the portion of ground called the grave represented on the map as 339, containing 3 = 3 - 11 statute measures be taken for manure heaps and a burying ground—Moved by Colonel Owen seconded by Mr Richards that the part of the grave recommended by Mr Wilkinson be taken for the above purpose at a rent of £600 per annum—Carried unanimously—Clerk is directed to forward a map including the plot now taken to the Commissioners, and inform them that the Board wish it to be purchased in the lease.

The Clerk reports that he received the new rate Book for the Compton Electoral Division from the Revising Valuator, and that he gave notice of it being open for inspection of rate payers as directed on the 5<sup>th</sup> Volume.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:

The entries in the Master's Journal were read as follows—

In consequence of the removal of Cholera patients to Boyer's house, I was directed to purchase 3 dozen Tins and a metal pot, which I have done.

The report of the Medical officer was read as follows

I have to report the occurrence of 175 cases of Cholera, since the morning of Monday the 27<sup>th</sup> of January of whom 62 have died. The malady is decidedly on the decrease since yesterday morning—on Wednesday last I commenced removing all the promising cases to Boyer's house out of the wooden house which is full— I shall next delect the convalescent to a wing of the Building and then as far as possible keep the sick separate from the rest of the house— I have had one very severe case of Cholera in the fever Hospital this week, the man is likely to recover— The assistance I have met with during this arduous week from both officers and paupers in the Workhouse has been most gratifying and worthy of being made known to the Board of Guardians.

The masters requisition book was laid before the Board and orders were duly made for the surgical articles specified namely 5 Hides of Bull Leather 7 pound of pitch 7 pounds of Resin and 3 ounces of hair—

15 The application of the nurse for an increase of salary the consideration of which was postponed on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Instants was considered and letters were read from the Protestant and Roman Catholic Chaplains which were highly satisfactory as to her character and competency and earnestly recommending her for an increase of salary. The following resolution was thereupon and carried unanimously — That the salary of Mrs. Gordon nurse be raised to £6 per annum her original salary and that this Board consider it but due to her to express their approval of her attention at all times, more especially during the late outbreak of Cholera in the Workhouses.

16 The Application of the Shoemaker for an increase of salary the consideration of which was postponed on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Instants was also considered — Refused.

17 The Rev<sup>d</sup> Mr. Hobson perpetual Curate of Kiltshan appeared before the Board and stated that in consequence of the great number of paupers buried in that churchyard (which is very small) during the recent outbreak of Cholera in the Workhouses, it would be inadvisable to bury any more there, and it was resolved that the master be directed to send a responsible person to call on Mr. Foley (one of the Guardians) who had kindly stated that he would point out a spot in the Clonathan Churchyard for the burial of paupers for a short time until the Board get possession of Charlotte's Grove, and that the persons sent to Mr. Foley, be directed to have a deep large Grave opened so that several coffins may be buried in one grave. Those Burials are to take place at a very early hour in the morning, and sufficient carts are to be procured so that the whole of the Burials may get through the town before 5 o'clock A.M. — The Board have been compelled to take this step, not having at present any other place to bury the dead.

18 In consequence of the representations of one of the members of the Sanitary Committee as to the filthy state of the town of Garry, Doctor Scales the medical Officer in charge of the District was called upon to appear before the Board, and having represented that the prevalence of Cholera was from the filthy state of the town. It was resolved — That this Board do authorize the Sanitary Committee to employ persons to remove any manure or other nuisance, and to purchase lime for whitewashing the houses of those persons who are unable to do so themselves, and any other proceedings they may consider requisite for the health of the town also to communicate with the Landlords requesting them to have the houses of their tenantry whitewashed, and in cases where the Landlords refuse doing so the Committee are to cause them to be done with notice and summoned before the magistrates at petty sessions. — And that the Committee will furnish the Board with a report of their proceedings and expenditure weekly.

19 Clerk is directed to write to Mr. Brown Sub-Inspector of Constabulary at Garry and request of him to give the Sanitary Committee all the assistance in his power.

20 Clerk is directed to write to Doctor Scales Medical Officer of the Garry District and inform him that the Board do not wish him to attend Cholera patients in their own homes but to have them removed to the Hospital at once.

21 The following rate on the Carnolin Electoral Division was signed this day Rate at 3/- on the pound £1303..15..10 1/4 Areas of former Rate £104..13..14 3/4 Rate £1418..9..3 — Clerk is directed to give the necessary notice of the Rate having been assessed and to have the Collector's Book ready so that the warrant may be signed on Saturday next.

Only two cases of Cholera have appeared in the Workhouse during the past week, I have <sup>however</sup> to report eight deaths from Cholera, The numbers reported to the Central Board of Health on the 18<sup>th</sup> February from the 27<sup>th</sup> January were 196 deaths & 71 prior to the severe outbreak on the 27<sup>th</sup> January, there had been 71 cases of Cholera and 28 deaths from 18<sup>th</sup> Nov; Making a total of 267 and 125 deaths. I have been enabled to evacuate Boys' Houses, which is against the disposal of Doctor Sedall should he find it necessary to remove any of the town's people.

The house is still plagued with both Dysentery and Diarrhoea, The Medical Officer also reports eleven deaths from the following causes viz Cholera 8 - Dysentery 2 Infirmary 1

Clerk is directed to write to the Commissioners informing them that the Board have received a communication from Lieutenant Henry in which he states that it is necessary that the emigrant girls should arrive in Dublin in time to embark in the steamer which leaves the North Wall on Thursday the 23<sup>rd</sup> Instant, and as the Commissioners state the steamer will sail on the 30<sup>th</sup> Instant the Board request they will inform them at their earliest convenience which of those days the steamer by which the emigrants are to go, will sail from Dublin.

Letter from Mr. Crawford (Poor Law Inspector) stating that he will attend here on Saturday the 23<sup>rd</sup> Instant to investigate the complaints made by the Medical Officer of the Workhouse in his report of the 15<sup>th</sup> February. Mr. Crawford attended accordingly but in consequence of the Medical Officer being unable to attend, he postpones the investigation until this day fortnight. Clerk is directed to summon the Board

Letter from Messrs Woodcock & Wilson <sup>late Wm. & J. Wilson</sup> transmitting names to be awarded relative to the case of John Doyle - Clerk reports that he reviewed their claims -

Letter from Mr. W. M. Lee 30<sup>th</sup> March 1850 stating that he has attended to <sup>8</sup> cases of Cholera in the town of Gorey, and enclosing a Bill for attendance at the Workhouse as medical Assistant to Doctor Bowen, in which he could not exact the amount, the Board not having faced the remuneration - Resolved that the sum of £10 be paid to Mr. Lee for his attendance at the Workhouse, and the 3 cases of Cholera attended by him in the town of Gorey -

Letter from F. Lyding & Co. Duncannon 21<sup>st</sup> March 1850 acknowledging the receipt of Clerk's letter inquiring them that their tender to supply a boiler had been accepted, and stating that they will supply the boiler at the price stated in their tender delivered at Duncannon, and when it is ready will send the Bill, and on receipt of the amount will receive the boiler, Clerk is directed to Messrs. Lyding & Co. that in their tender they agree to deliver the boiler in Gorey, and that their account will be paid when the boiler is received -

18 The Report of the Workhouse Sanitary Committee at a meeting held on the 19<sup>th</sup> instant was submitted to the Board in which they stated that out of the 16 patients now in the Cholera Hospital 4 are convalescent and may be discharged but <sup>that</sup> two of them are children who have no friends to receive them, and requesting the decisions of the Board on the subject, with regard to the remaining 6 cases they state that they are Supercutory cases, and request the Board will give directions to have them removed to the District Fever Hospital, which is open for receiving as well as fever, in order that the Cholera Hospital may be closed that disease having disappeared. Clerk is directed to inform this Committee that the 2 children alluded to are to be sent to the Workhouse, and the 6 Supercutory cases are to be removed to the District Fever Hospital.

13 On the application of the People a pauper for money to support himself and family for one week to enable him to leave the Workhouse, it was ordered that he should get 5/- which was subscribed by the Board for that purpose.

14 The tender of Robert Earl to supply about 3 tons of fresh cut straw at 1/- per cut, was accepted.

15 In accordance with the Commissioners Order of the 5<sup>th</sup> February 1849 Messrs. Woodroffe & Juley are appointed a committee to take stock of provisions. Clothing linen &c on the 25<sup>th</sup> instant.

16 Ordered that the salary due to the late Patrick Murphy for his services as schoolmaster viz. £1..18..4 be paid to his father.

An Inquest was held on the body of Saebij Barjan, a pauper who died suddenly on the evening of the 23<sup>rd</sup> Instant. The verdict was that he came by his death in consequence of having eaten a great quantity of indigestible vegetable food which he gathered in a field near the Workhouse.

Two female emigrants were sent by coach to Dublin yesterday operable to direction of Lieutenant. Henry Thompson accompanied by the matron. Charges — city 3 to Union 2 Dependants 1

Henry Porter a Pauper complains that while she was sick in Cholera she was obliged to give her apron to the Assistant Nurse in exchange for milk, the matron took the apron off the person of the assistant nurse.

Doctor Leared sent from the Westminster Cholera Hospital the following articles viz 36 Blankets 46 Soap, 18 Towels 18 Sicks 14 Sheets & Chamber 9 1/2 Lins — At the time the above articles arrived here, the Matron, Assistant Master, School Master and I were engaged in packing the emigrants' clothes who were to leave for Dublin the following morning. I signed the porter to see them counted. He refused to do saying it was my duty, after which he treated me with great contempt in handing me a letter from Doctor Leared.

The Master and Assistant Master are bound to prosecute at the town council sessions on Wednesday next. — The Book was signed by the Chairman.

Applications were read from Elizabeth Fitzsimons and Elizabeth Brennan for the situation of Handmistress. It was moved by Mr Hely seconded by Mr Richards that Elizabeth Fitzsimons be appointed to a salary of £8 per annum, with apartments and notices.
