The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated from No. 3265 to No. 3268, inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read, to the following effect: Clerk reports that he furnished

each collector with a copy of the Commissioners Circular No. 14.889 of 14th March 1852. Informed the Commissioners that there is no town in the Union for which Commissioners have been appointed under the Act of 1844 Chap 82 and informed Mr Smith that the Board cannot interfere in the matter referred to in his letter.

11 The following letter was read from the medical officer of the Workhouse and ordered to be inserted on the minutes -

" From the official experience I have had of the Working of the Poor Laws " since their establishment in this country, I can state that the most expensive " thing I know of is sickness - its concomitants and consequences, and " therefore, even if in an economic point of view, the subject is worthy " of all consideration. My object is simply to look into the question practically " and see how far prevention may be substituted for cure. It is universally ad- " mitted that in proportion as people are accumulated in one locality, they are " inclined to disease, and that nothing can ward off the evil consequences, but the " strictest attention to the ^{personal} wants of each individual, in respect to Cleanliness, " Clothing, and food. Many have been the complaints about food, in this " workhouse, and in consequence the subject ^{has} received much consideration " and the food is now both wholesome and good. - It would be well if a similar class " our had been raised with respect to clothing, and cleanliness. but the poor " creatures who take shelter here are so accustomed to rags and filth, that they bear " with anything & very seldom complain. However this does not lessen the evil which " is sure to arise in the shape of sickness, the most expensive thing, as I have " said before, in the management of a Workhouse - I strongly recommend that " there should be washing rooms constructed for each class & daily and regularly " made use of, as one of the chief means of prevention - Since I thought this matter " under the consideration of the Board, I have visited the Wexford Workhouse, and saw " that it had no less than five washing rooms, exclusive of the general Laundry " and the Bath rooms, in the probationary wards, where I may remark, the " paupers on admission are obliged to wash their own clothes - "

The Books and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year).

As at present constituted workhouses can only be looked upon, as places that tolerate evil and perpetuate poverty - the former is perhaps indispensable, but the latter may be much modified and prevented by determined efforts for the improvement of the young - unless some material change is made with ~~their~~ ^{their} intention, we shall have our country supplanted with a stunted, scrophulous, crushed race of human beings, only calculated to sink us lower in the social scale. Witness what a failure Charter schools were, and what deplorable specimens of humanity Foundling Hospital children become, Workhouses will be found to turn out the same sort of stock or I am much mistaken - The taint of Scrophula spreads among children who live crowded together in a marvellous manner, and becomes most difficult of cure - The Sanatory preservation of children is to me, one of the greatest difficulties of the present Workhouse system. Children here are not only the most numerous class, but also the most prone to disease, and when once tainted, they rarely grow up wholesome and sound. - The Healthy young people embrace many things that are essential viz. Cleanliness, Clothing, Food, Sleeping and occupation, and I may add Kindness - There has been more than once a remarkable mortality among the children of this institution and at present there is much unhealthiness among them, which might be lessened by a strict Classification, and attention to their several wants - I now beg leave to assure the Board of Guardians, that they will at all times find me both ready and anxious to cooperate with them in forwarding any plans for a desirable and highly economic an object as the prevention of disease -

12 Letter from Owen Hovel weaver 5th April 1850 Requesting an increase in his wages which is only 6/- Per week - Refused -

13 Letter from Mr Owen Redmond Flannel Contractor 5th April 1850 stating that in consequence of his tender to supply flannel having been accepted in May last, he has manufactured a large quantity of that article which now remains on his hands - and requesting the Board to give him an order for 300 yards - Clerk is directed to inform Mr Redmond that there is no flannel wanted at present -

14 Letter from Messrs J. Ryeing & Co Limerick 27th March 1850 stating that they cannot deliver the Boiler in Cork for the price stated in their tender. On the reading of this letter it was resolved that the tender Messrs J. & M. Mallet (which was received on the same day as Messrs Ryeing) to supply a Cast iron Boiler to contain 300 Gallons at 9/- Per Gallon was accepted, provided it weighs 15 cwt. - Clerk is directed to inform Messrs Ryeing & Co that the Board will get the Boiler from another person -

The following Report from the Medical Officer of the Workhouse was read
 "I have been obliged to remove the Infirmary nurse tender Mrs Gordon out of the Workhouse in consequence of her broken up health, universal Sleepy and Dysentery, the schoolmistress Boland has been very unwell with Dysentery and wishes to go home to recruit, the Schoolmaster Whilly has been seriously ill with Dysentery, the general state of the house is most unhealthy - I have employed Mr Lee during the absence of Mr Gordon. Among the many things that suggest themselves to my mind as desirable in order to put the house into a sanatory condition the efficiency of the laundry is perhaps one of the most important - The present Laundry was built for 800 - the house now contains 1200 - and may accommodate 1500 - As the sick and bedridden amount to 3 or 400 a separate Laundry establishment would be for many reasons the most eligible - I cannot avoid attributing much of the unwholesome condition of the Workhouse to the small Laundry and also to the clothes ~~and bedding~~ and bedding of such a mass of sick ~~and~~ mixed up with the clothes of the house. Subject also to the women's yard being made use of as drying ground, it is hardly possible at times to walk through it. - I beg to suggest the appointment of a Sanatory Committee of 3 Guardians with whom I could confer on Monday morning at 10 o'clock upon several matters connected with the Sanatory regulation of the Workhouse - On the reading of this report Messrs Furney Foley Woodroffe and Surmen were appointed as a Sanatory Committee, and it was resolved that a nurse should be employed at a Salary of £1 per week, the Assistant Schoolmistresses allowed leave of absence for one week -

Above one fourth of the inmates are under the care of the Doctor, and Mr. Burke has no hesitation from his experience of other workhouses, in saying that so great an extent of sickness can only arise from want of due attention on the part of the officers in enforcing habits of order and cleanliness throughout the establishment & of all the modes of economy to be practised in a Workhouse. Cleanliness is the greatest the reverse of it promotes sickness and consequent expense.
- 10. Mr. Burke sees no remedy for the present state of the Workhouse, but in having efficient officers to conduct its management and which Mr. Burke has no hesitation in saying that it does not at present possess.

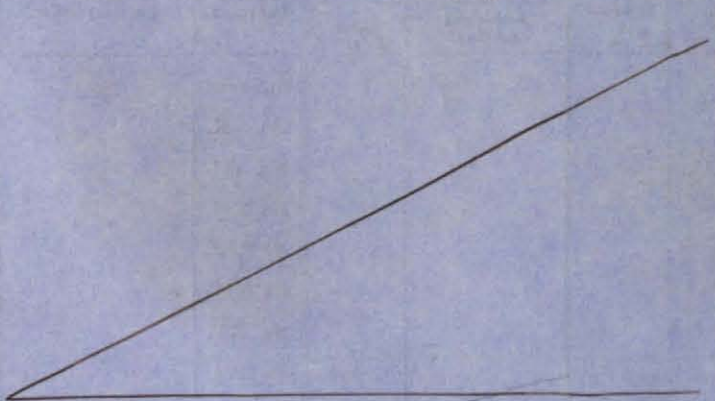

The following report of Mr Burke Poor Law Inspector was read by him —

George Wynn

2nd Nov^r 1850

Mr. Burke inspected the Workhouse on Wednesday last, and submits the following remarks respecting it.

- 1 The Matrons ^{day} Room was in an untidy state amongst other articles was a cradle & a press bed in which a pauper woman stated to be Matrons servant sleeps. It appears that three children the Matrons are kept in the Workhouse this being contrary to the understanding at the time of his appointment
- 2 The nurses were at dinner but in any thing but an orderly way, several of them being through the Hall and passage leading to the kitchen, there was no officer in the dining Hall at the time and the door leading from it to the women's yard was open —
- 3 The clothes stores not in a tidy or clean state
- 4 The Bedding with some few exceptions was clean, but the floors of the dormitories are not swept after being washed and dried. The consequence is that the grease on the floors and under the beds gives the dormitories the appearance of not being clean
- 5 The yard adjoining the new Building remains in an unpurged state.

6 The Schoolmaster seems to be little acquainted with the management of a school when he permits the boys to loiter in the privy, No. less than 11 boys were hiding in it. — On Mr Burke's last visit there were 17 girls hiding in the same way in the privy in the girls yard.

7 But little Progress is making with the Cultivation of the land lately taken which with the exception of a small patch sub-soiled within the last few weeks lies in a waste state, it would be desirable that the Guardians saw what has been effected in the Workhouse Farm at Duisconthy.

8 Mr Burke suggested some weeks since to the master the necessity of keeping a manufacture Book shewing on the M^r. side the Cost of the raw material and on the C^r. side the produce on which a fair price should be placed by the Guardians it would be then seen every week when this Book should be laid before the Guardians whether the manufacture of Articles was being carried on to advantage, the Book however has not been written up and at present there is nothing to show as to the quantity or value of articles manufactured.

9 Mr Burke must give impress on the Guardians that unless a visiting Committee occasionally inspect the Workhouse they cannot expect that it will be well or economically managed it appears from the Visiting Committee Book that but six weekly reports have been made by the Visiting Committee during the past year.
