

"In the month of August last an injunction was sent down to me by Mess^{rs} Barrington & Solicitors for Mr. Foster calling upon me to require the Tenants upon certain parts of Rosminague and Bann Park to execute an attornment to Mr. Foster under the provisions of the Encumbered Estates act. I accordingly did require them to execute such attornment which they refused to do and I was then compelled to hand the injunction to the Sheriff to take up the Possession which was done."

"After the execution of the injunction three of the Farmers were given back their lands"

"Besides these three were 6 small holdings held by Parties who gave the Keys of their Houses up to the Sheriff"

their things not being disturbed and were put back by me as caretakers until such time as it was decided by Mr. Justice whether they should be put back into their small tenancies or some other arrangement made respecting them."

"Three of these families have since been put back into their holdings as tenants and the others still remain as caretakers."

"There were of the families then despoised of parties from the farms & these parties were since put into the houses by the 3 tenants and only 3 families were removed off the lands altogether."

"Besides having given money to two of the parties who have remained with the farmers, I gave two pounds to two and one pound to the other that was removed."

"There was no special notice on the Relieving Officer served by me because I did not consider that on an attachment injunction from the Encumbered Estates Court such was necessary. I heard from the Police Sergeant at Camolin that a general notice had been served as the Police report stated but it seems it was not sufficient and I now see that a special notice ought to have been served. I really did not think it necessary, however I can assure the Board that it was not with any wish to evade the law but purely inadvertence on my part."

"The Messrs. Barrington have since stated to me that several similar injunctions have occurred under the Encumbered Estates Court without notice on the Relieving Officer and that no steps have been taken in consequence and in sending down the injunction to me they did not as is their custom

This may at first sight seem a large quantity for one fire but it must be remembered that this one fire does the work of three - it cooks the food in the Kitchen and by means of the steam pipes boils the water in the Laundry and dries the clothes in the drying room.

The quantity of coals used in the Kitchen it is evident must also vary in fine weather it will be less than in wet.

The quantity allowed for the probationary 1 Stone daily for two fire places is totally insufficient in the probationary the clothing worn by the paupers on their admission is washed and dried & fire is required for any miserable case that comes in. There were 14 stones of coals used in these rooms up to last evening. It is evident the quantity used here must vary as well as in the Kitchen (over)

To the Right Honourable & Honourable the Knights, Burgesses, and Commoners, in Parliament assembled.

"We, the undersigned

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Guardians of Unisecally Union, most respectfully pray your Honourable House to take into consideration the unprecedented Circumstances under which this portion of the United Kingdom, prostrated by an awful visitation, became chargeable under the 13th Victoria Cap 14 for sums then advanced by Government for the immediate relief of the poorer Classes.

Your Petitioners most respectfully and earnestly pray, that viewing this as a National calamity, to the alleviation of which, the Nation at large should contribute; and also taking into consideration the distressed position of the Rate Payers, otherwise heavily taxed, your Honourable House will be graciously pleased to cancel the annuities now chargeable under said Act.

Your Petitioners further beg to state that they feel deeply impressed with the injustice of all taxations for the Relief of the Poor falling exclusively on land, whereas it appears to your Petitioners that a fair proportion of such charges ought to be directly or indirectly borne by all those whose property (of whatever description) enables them to contribute.

We would therefore most respectfully suggest that those charges usually denominated as the staff expenses falling on each Union, in addition of the staff expenses attendant on the Medical Charities Act, should be paid defrayed out of the Consolidated Fund leaving each Union to provide for those charges only which are strictly applicable to the clothing, maintenances and medical relief of the Poor of each locality.

We therefore, most respectfully pray that your Honourable House will graciously take into consideration the propriety of amending the law so as to obviate the injustice which your petitioners complain.
