In visiting the Infirmary I find a general commotion among the patients Nurses and Caretakers of the Wards Complaining that the Punatics and the infirm do not receive either in quality or quantity the Bread that is ordered by the Doctor or the Board I cannot report whether this complaint be true or otherwise, but I would suggest that that it would be examined into by some members of the Board as

the complaint would scarcely be so general without some foundation.

Order. Master cautioned to be particular in giving out the full quantity of bread to the Infirmary and in the event of any complaint being made by a nurse on the receipt of the bread the Master is to weigh it in her presence

Sunday

Had to use sweet milk for breakfast. Found an adult boy belonging to the nurse over the idiot ward in a spare room with a fire and preparations for tea - spat him <sup>out</sup> and locked the door - Peter Stanford absconded -

Monday

James Burgess absconded this night about 12 o'clock Burgess and Reilly were caught outside the mens yard and another person who escaped

Tuesday

Found the room of the idiot ward again open and in a press a piece of soap a new shoe some potatoes and a pail of milk. Had to give sweet milk for breakfast

Wednesday

Barrett and Kavanagh short had no milk for the Childrens supper

No 8646/54 24<sup>th</sup> March 1854 Stating they have received a report from their Inspector of the result of the inquiry held by him into the Charges preferred against the Medical Officer by Mr Oshaugney and that they will address the Board of Guardians on the subject at their next meeting

Mr John Redmond applied for some sacks that are due - Mr Redmond was told that the Board do not consider they have anything to do with it



Resolved that a return to be made weekly, showing the names with numbers in Registry of each pauper who obtains a pass showing also the date when such pass was granted and the intention for what it is given and if the pauper overstay his pass

The report of the Finance Committee was read as follows

Eveny 25<sup>th</sup> March 1854

The bills for the past month and those of the half year ending this day, were laid before the Committee and amount to £587-6-8 there remain still about 150-0-0 of account not yet brought in.

The balance in favor of the Union, with the Treasurer amounts only to the sum of £115-4-8.

My Lords,

I made application for the payment of a Guinea to Dr Isdale, on account of the urgency of the case involving as it did several attendances in the course of the day. I visited the woman twice and Dr Isdale saw her 3 times - Doctor Isdale came to my house purposely to consult about the case in the afternoon and we went to the Poor House together in the evening the woman has not yet been able to leave her bed & it is now 4 weeks since the occurrence under the circumstances I judged I was only doing right in asking for a fee to be paid to Doctor Isdale


It was with a mixed feeling of surprise &  
 regret that I read the letter from the Poor Law Commissioners stating  
 that I had forfeited their confidence and requesting the Guardians  
 to call for my resignation. - Although the number of days as taken  
 from the Porters Book on which my name does not appear in at-  
 tendance at the Workhouse, seems at first sight to be consider-  
 able, there are several entries on the part of Mr Lee and Dr Isdale  
 of visits paid for me, and there were many days on  
 which I did not pass through the hall so that during the year  
 the omissions could not have amounted to more than 10 or  
 12 days, even the Porters Book records 330 visits made  
 by me, 21 visits paid by Mr Lee, and 9 by Dr Isdale

When I said that Sunday was a dies Non - I did not  
 mean to imply that I never attended on Sunday for I  
 constantly do - but I meant to state that a discretionary  
 power attendance of 6 days out of 7 might reasonably be  
 considered as sufficient for the requirements of the sick  
 I holding myself always responsible that nothing  
 injurious should occur in consequence of my absence  
 I must however express my regret at not having more  
 literally fulfilled the letter of the Commissioners instructions



and I shall in future strive to conform strictly to the Commission's Regulations — I can assure the Board and the Poor Law Commissioners that I have been always most careful that no instance of anything urgent and requiring attention should occur without the means of remedy and I can confidently refer to the general state of the Infirmary and Fever Hospital that the treatment and comfort of the Sick is properly attended to — The Fever Hospital which I have conducted for 16 years has I believe the full confidence of the public, the comparatively low rate of mortality has been quite remarkable, and the nurse is notorious for her attention and humanity to the Sick — With reference to the use and administration of medicines by the nurse the following is the course which I have always adopted viz Medicines come from Dublin in this form Compound pills Powders Plaster, Ointments &c in state prepared for immediate use, and I have only to specify to the nurse the quantities to be used, as to their being illiterate, I find <sup>that</sup> they can read the name and quantity of any medicine I may direct — In the year 1852 I experienced great difficulty in conducting the Union Infirmary from the employment of nurses from Dublin the 3 I had trial of proved unskilful, and I chose the present Infirmary nurse, much because she had never been in an Hospital before, and although it cost me great pains & trouble to teach her her business I have the satisfaction of knowing that the Sick are not now neglected and that whatever order is punctually attended to — The most serious charge against me viz that 14 persons died without my attendance has I find been abandoned as having no foundation — I can safely affirm that throughout my long services as Medical Officer to the Union, I have never willingly permitted
