## The Master's Report,

Nov 23<sup>rd</sup> 1861.

The master reports that on yesterday evening at 4<sup>th</sup> O'clock 3 able-bodied men (Vagrants) whose respective ages are 16 18 & 20 demanded lodging. I asked them if they had a ticket from the Relieving Officer and they said not. nor would they look for one. I told them I would give them no admission without it. and ordered them outside the gate. When they began swearing and using most abusive language and cursing they would break the door & windows, I then wrote a note to the sub inspector of Countabalary "stating that 3 men (vagrants) were at the door threatening to break it and the windows and that I required his protection"

His Reply.

"I do not consider that I would be justified in interfering in the case you allude to, also I am under the impression that these men are destitute it is the duty of the Relieving Officer to give them an order of admission."

Edward Lorry, Lorry 23<sup>rd</sup> Nov 1861.

When they found the police did not come they became more violent, pulling the bell and broke six panes of glass. I then went to Admiral Owen J. P. and he desired me to go to Mr Lorry and give him his compliments to beg he would interfere. I went then to Mr Lorry as directed but he still told me it was not his business and that I ought to admit them. I told him there was an order from the Poor Law Commissioners against night lodgers. - When I returned they were gone and at 10 to 9 o'clock they came with tickets from the Relieving Officer for a nights lodging. - Ordered that the master do lodge information before a Magistrate against these 3 men.

Since their admission they broke more glass and took their own clothes and put them over the Probationary windows, (over)

When the Board was <sup>sitting</sup> they burned their clothes in the Probationary, what are they to do for clothes? — Ordered that the master do supply some of the refuse clothing for those men in their leasing the House,

Resolved that the master be directed to send a copy of the Report laid before the Board by him to-day, to ~~order~~ the Chairman of the Gorey Petty sessions at their next Meeting and call his attention to the refusal of the Police Officer to interfere when requested by him to do so on last evening —

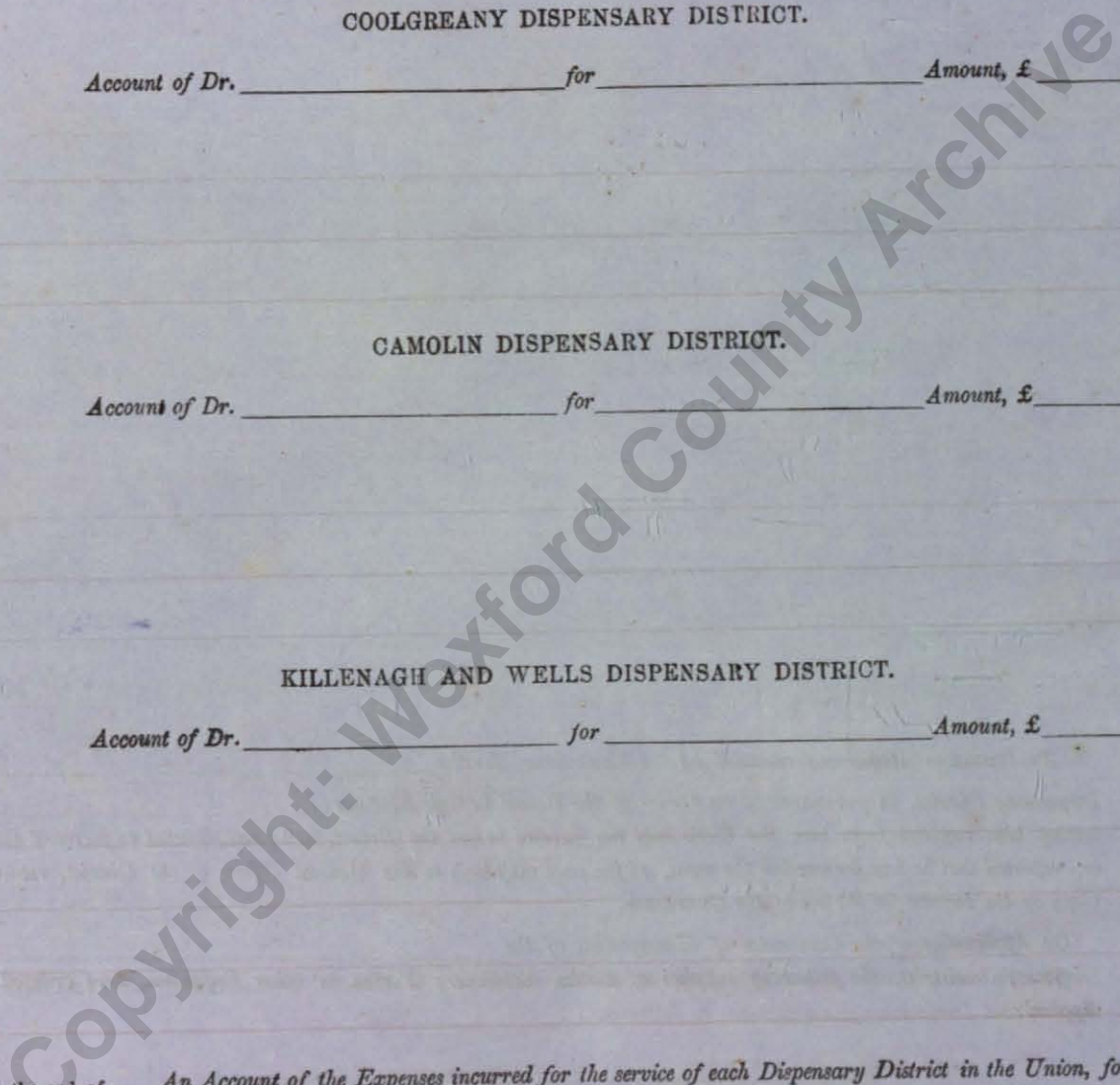

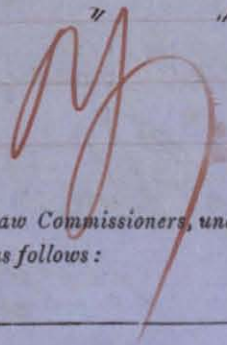
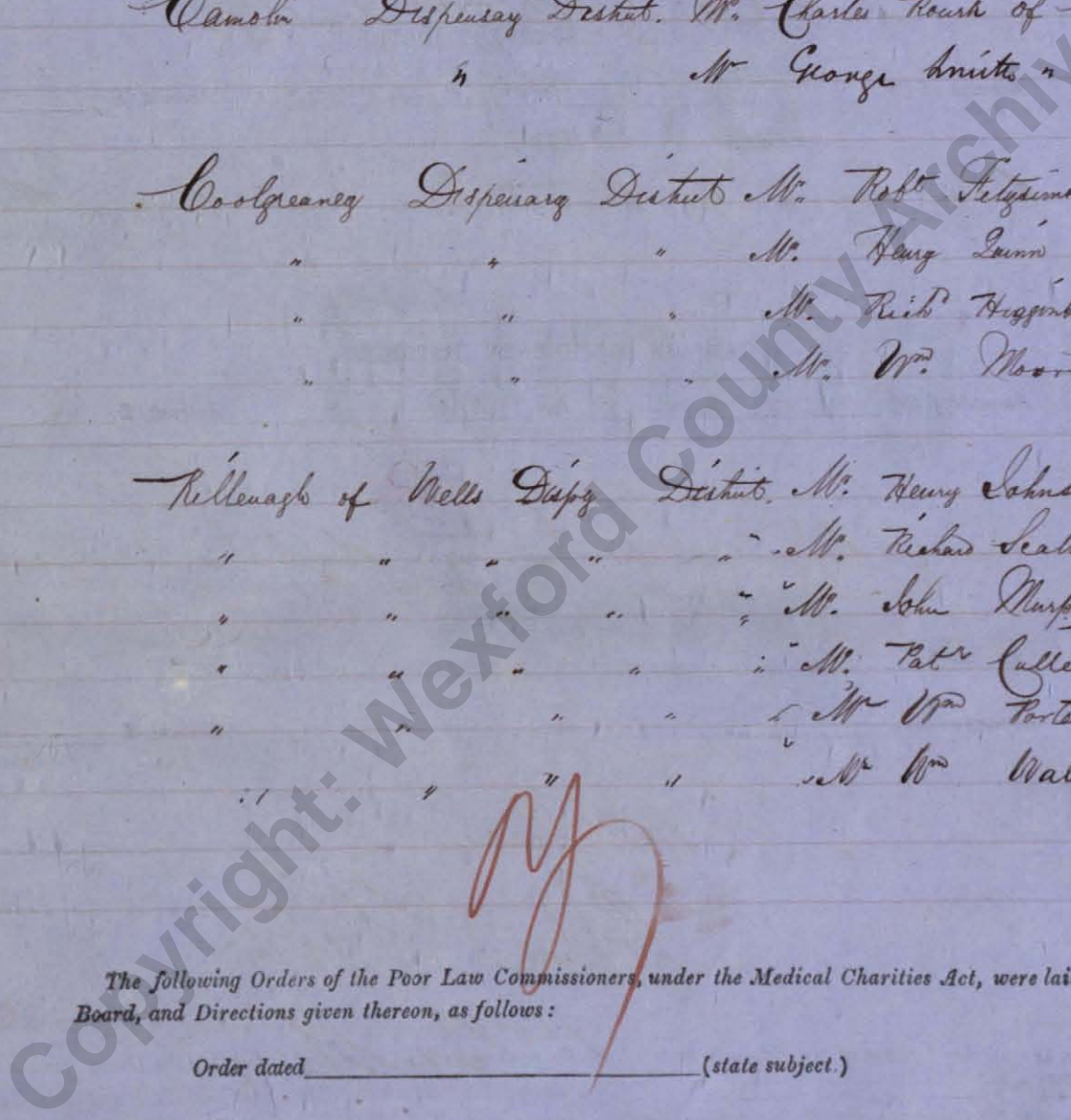
